Hector Buote, Tignish postmaster is chairman of the organizing committee and he and Dr. Dubucanac, the resident physician, have attended all meetings to present the case in favour of a hospital. The difficulty of transporting patients to the Western Hospital at Alberton during the winter months is one of the main arguments being advanced in favour of the hospital also the government hospitalization plan which will be coming into effect in a year or so.

LET'S TALK IT OVER Bouquets To Flower Show And A Caution To Parents

"Say it with flowers," is an old maxim familiar to everyone, and that is what the Summerside I.O.D.E. Provincial Flower Show has been doing very effectively for the last few years. In these troublous times when H-bombs and inter-continental missiles hold the spotlight in men's minds, it is comforting to know that some people are doing what they can to emphasize that, as Keats put it, "a thing of beauty is a joy forever." The advice given to young people not to be in too much of a hurry to leave school is of course, sound. Parents who are able to leave their children a substantial share of worldly wealth naturally feel happy that this is so, but if you can leave them an adequate education, that is far superior to material riches. In those days of opportunity for youth you don't have to be wealthy to do that. On the other hand, (and we expect expressions of horror at this), there are undoubtedly boys and girls who stay in school too long. If a student is wasting his time in school, either through wilful neglect or inability to cope with his studies (particularly the latter), he is better out of school. Some parents fondly think that if their boy is in school there is some kind of magic working that will insure his deriving profit out of the experience. On the contrary, there is nothing more damaging to the process of character development than a sense of frustration, and in the case of those students who can learn but won't, a period of work outside the school often sends them back with a new attitude towards the value of study. Pupils who shirk all responsibilities in school may develop a complex of inertia that could stick with them the rest of their lives.
