Police Dragnet Nabs Three In Prince Co. After Breaks

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN Three town residents are being held in connection with a series of five break-ins following an eight-hour Sunday morning dragnet carried out in Prince County by five Island police departments. Two men riding bicycles on Foley Linkletter Road at 7 a.m. Sunday were arrested when they failed to see an RCMP roadblock and a third Summerside man was apprehended while walking on a highway near the St. Eleanors-Summerside town line at approximately 7 a.m. The three men will appear in Prince County Magistrate's court later this week in connection with a theft at Peoples Store in Mt. Carmel and a break and attempted robbery at Antioch Richards' store, Mt. Carmel, Sunday morning. All roads leading to the Mt. Carmel area were blocked by police officials at 3:45 a.m. Sunday, following the discovery of one of the break-ins, and the dragnet was not lifted until 8:00 a.m. Sunday. It is believed thieves first broke into the Richard store taking cigarettes, coffee and a quantity of groceries, but later abandoned their small, panel truck in front of Peoples' because of mechanical difficulties. Loot from the Richard store was found in the truck and the safe from the Peoples' store was found on the ground beside the vehicle. Taking part in the dragnet responsible for the arrest of the three Summerside men were the Charlottetown, Summerside and Borden detachments RCMP and the Borden and Summerside town police.

MINISTER CALLS (Continued from page 1) swelled by Canada's sale of 22,000 bushels of wheat to the Soviet Union. Capt. R. J. Listermont, Montreal barometerist, said the wheat will have little effect in Montreal unless it lasts past Monday. Montreal grain elevators hold some 19,000,000 bushels of wheat and even at the best rate of unloading would take six days to empty. By late Saturday, a total of 18 ships, had berthed at the pier and were stranded in Montreal. Quebec harbor, where three ships were left crewless, also expected no difficulty is expected until after Monday. At Montreal SU headquarters, union organizers said they knew nothing of any offers from union leadership to call off the dogs.
