

Gignac Impressive In Work-out; Selke Tells Ernst Play With Braves

Guy Gignac, a 180 pound left winger from Quebec, arrived here yesterday and worked out with the Islanders at their morning practise session. He will accompany the team to Glace Bay tonight for their league game against the Miners.

Gignac played on a line with Merv Towers and Elwood Ritchie and impressed railbirds with his performance. Coach Bucko Trainer was well satisfied with his first impressions of the new player and states he will be a solid addition to the team.

However, there was some gloom in the Islanders camp due to the fact that they could not obtain Ringo Ernst. Frank Selke, the General Manager of the Montreal Canadiens balked at the proposal of Ernst playing in the Maritimes and ordered him to play with Valleyfield or else.

Bill LeBlanc, the other defenseman whom the Islanders hope to

land, was still in Mont Joli yesterday. At first it was thought that LeBlanc was on his way here but he phoned the Islanders yesterday and told them he was having some trouble in getting his final clearance from the Quebec Club.

The chances of LeBlanc coming to the Islanders still appear bright and Trainer thinks there is a good possibility he may yet be here for Thursday night's game against Halifax Atlantics.

Trainer was also trying to get in touch with Marcel Clements last night. The big left winger has been declared a free agent in the N.O.H.A. League and it is possible that he would consider returning to the Maritimes.

Cecil "Bubby" Dowling who has been shelved for a week with a knee injury, will be back in action tonight against the Miners. Orin Carver, who also has been sidelined with a bad knee is starting to skate again and should be ready next week.

Amateur Athletic Union Opens Its 60th Jubilee Annual Meeting Today

MONTREAL, (CP)—The Amateur Athletic Union of Canada opens its 60th jubilee annual meeting today with a program that includes preparation for the British Empire Games and the selection of outstanding athletes who will receive trophy awards.

Decision will be reached on the place and dates for trials to determine the make-up of Canada's Empire Games team. Entries close July 9, and it is likely the trials will be held no later than the weekend of July 2. The team may be kept together after the trials in readiness for the games.

So far 20 empire countries—the most on record—have filed entries for the big sports spectacle in Vancouver next summer.

R. F. (Bob) Osborne of Vancouver will report on the city's preparations for the games. The report will show that the stadium is 25 per cent completed and excavation of the swimming pool is nearly done.

Decision on awards of three trophies will be made—the J. W. Davis Trophy for the outstanding track and field athlete in Canada; the Fred A. N. Rowell Trophy for the outstanding field athlete; and the Norton H. Crowe trophy, top award to the outstanding AAU athlete.

Nominations for the Davis Trophy include Doug Clement of Vancouver and Selwyn Jones of Hamilton, both distance runners, and Keith Holman, Montreal hurdler who set the Canadian record of 55.7 in beating Harry Whittle at the 440-yard hurdle event in Montreal.

Those named for the Rowell Trophy include Bob Adams of Saskatoon, discus thrower; Ron Miller of Toronto, Pole Vaulter, and John Tavellch of Vancouver, shotput specialist.

Nominations for the Norton H. Crowe trophy include those named for the other awards and Doug Hepburn, world champion weight-lifter from Vancouver.

Today's sessions open with an executive meeting, followed by registration of delegates. President Jim Worrall of Toronto will address the official opening in the afternoon, and a reception and dinner will be held in the evening.

General sessions and committee meetings will be held Thursday, with the jubilee dinner at night.

Friday's program calls for more general and committee meetings. The British Empire Games Association of Canada will hold a night meeting.

The Canadian Olympic Association meets Saturday followed by the final general session and election of officers.

Senators, Lumber Kings In Quarrel Over Players

TORONTO, (CP)—Motions to prevent Frank (Butch) Stahan and Emilie Dagenais from continuing to play with Pembroke Lumber Kings of the Northern Ontario Hockey Association senior league were filed at Osgoode Hall Tuesday.

Stahan and Dagenais are under contract with Ottawa Senators of the Quebec Hockey League but are playing with Pembroke. An injunction granted last month by Judge John T. Mulochy of Renfrew county court permitted them to continue with the Lumber Kings until the matter of ownership was settled in court.

The motions were filed by the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association and the NOHA and are intended to upset the injunction.

It is believed Stahan and Dagenais will be able to continue playing for Pembroke for at least another week. The motions are scheduled to be heard today but are expected to be adjourned for a week.

LITTLE SPORT



The Saint Dunstan's University senior football team wound up its operations for the season last Saturday afternoon with a 6-2 victory over Dalhousie University at Halifax. The game was the fifth for the Saints during the season and it left the local Collegians with a pass mark of fifty percent. In their five starts the Saints won twice against Dal, lost two to Mount Allison and played the Abbies to a scoreless draw. Taking everything into consideration it was a pretty good year for the Saints although they did not enjoy the outstanding success they earned a year ago when they won the McCurdy Cup.

The Saints did a re-building job on their team this year after losing nine members of their 1952 McCurdy Cup team. Coach A. J. MacAdam rebuilt well and came within a very narrow margin of winning the regional intercollegiate championship. The Saints practically had the championship within their grasp when they led Mount Allison University 6-2 in their first game of the year with only a few minutes of playing time remaining. They blew the lead and the Mounts won the game 7-6. Had the Saints held onto their margin they would now be playing against Acadia for the Maritime Intercollegiate championship.

The biggest blow to the Saints' cause this year was the loss of forward Art Pendergast early in the season due to a knee injury. Art missed the first two games which the Saints lost. His return to the team for the last part of the season gave the Saints' scrum a lot more push with the result that the Saints were able to get the ball instead of their opponents.

Coach MacAdam figured he had a better backfield this year than he had in any year. All the backfielders except wingman Lloyd Gaudet and Paul Jay and three-quarter man Allan MacDonald were newcomers. The most outstanding was possibly Gus Dorais, the broken field running flying quarter. Dorais ran for twenty-five yards to score the Saints' first try against Dalhousie on Saturday. It was his only try of the year but he helped set up plenty.

The final game of the intermediate series between the Second Saints and Prince of Wales College will likely be played on Friday afternoon at Memorial Field. This series has now resolved itself into a sudden-death affair. It started as a best of three series with the first game ending in a 10-10 draw. The Saints won the second 3-0 and the Welshmen bounced back to win the third 13-10. The series was even every way you look at it as both teams scored a total of 23 points. Friday's game should be quite an interesting affair.

Abbies, Glace Bay Will Play Sudden-Death Game In Antigonish On Sunday

The Charlottetown Abbies and the Glace Bay Caledonians will play a sudden-death game on the St. F. X. football field Sunday afternoon for the Maritime senior rugby championship. It was announced last night by Jim Coyle, Abegweit coach.

Coyle was in telephone conversation with Don MacInnis of Glace Bay yesterday and the two coaches agreed upon the sudden death affair at Antigonish.

Roy MacDonald of Glace Bay and Gordon Bennett of Charlottetown have been recommended as

referees. The two officials are acceptable to both clubs.

The Abbies, with several of their players still on the sidelines as the result of Saturday's rugged encounter against the Saint John Mariners, will hold a practice on Memorial Field this afternoon.

The winner of the Sunday game between the Abbies and Glace Bay will play the Intercollegiate winner on Saturday, November 21, for the McCurdy Cup. The game will be played on the home field of the senior champions.

Jimmy Carter Favorite To Retain Title Tonight In Bout With Savoie

MONTREAL, (AP)—Jimmy Carter, the lightweight champion, not the careless fighter who loses non-title bouts, defends his crown against Montreal's Armand Savoie Wednesday night at The Forum here.

Carter was beaten by Savoie on a split decision last February but the compact New York Negro is a 2-1 favorite here to win the rematch. However the price is about 5 to 1, in New York.

Savoie, sixth-ranked challenger, is two inches taller than 5-foot-6 Carter and has a 43-15-5 record for 51 pro fights since 1949.

The 15-round match will not be carried on radio or television. Promoter Eddie Quinn and matchmaker Raoul Godbout of Canadian Athletic Promotions expect a crowd of 11,000 and a gate of \$60,000. They had about \$30,000 in the till Tuesday.

First Since 1931

Montreal has not had a world championship fight since Panama Al Brown twice defended his bantam title in 1931. The record in door gate for the city is 11,558 and \$54,614, by Kid Gavilan and Laurent Dauthuille, Nov. 21, 1949.

Under the Montreal system, the referee does not have a vote. The decision is made by three judges, at ringside on a round basis. Officials will be named at the fight.

Willie Ketchum, Carter's manager, denied at a meeting of the Montreal Athletic Commission that he had protested the use of three judges who worked the first Carter-Savoie fight.

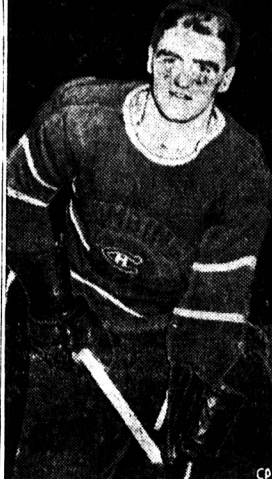
Carter will be making his third defence of the title he originally won from Ike Williams in 1951, lost to Lauro Salas and won back again from Salas, Oct. 15, 1952.

In non-title fights this year but usually where Don MacInnis, the Glace Bay coach is involved there's fire-works of one kind or another. Some times MacInnis gives cause for these fire-works and other times he's the innocent victim.

This year MacInnis is already involved in a football squabble with the Halifax Wanderers. The Wanderers were supposed to play in Glace Bay last Saturday and MacInnis went to considerable expense advertising the game and printing tickets. Due to some misunderstanding, however, the Wanderers never showed up. On the previous Saturday the Glace Bay team had made the trip to Halifax with the result that Glace Club lost a considerable amount of money on the series. MacInnis is now asking the Maritime Rugby Union to reimburse the money they lost or to suspend the Wanderers from football for one year.

Atlantics Edge Out Millionaires 5-4 With Two Third Period Goals

HALIFAX, (CP)—Two goals in the third period—one of them in the last second of play—gave Halifax Atlantics a 5-4 win over Sydney Millionaires Tuesday in a regular game of the Maritime Major Hockey League.

Agile Bill Ford, the league's leading scorer, fired the winning goal on a three-way effort with Pete Wyyatt and Bill Arcand just as the final whistle was about to blow. The win boosted Halifax into a first-place tie with Millionaires.

The teams battled to a 1-1 draw at the end of the first period, Sydney jumped ahead 4-3 in the second and then Atlantics won with their third-period drive.

George Robertson opened the scoring at 12:23 of the first period as Sydney broke the ice. Doug McPhee knotted the count six minutes later.

In the second Dugger McNeil sent Halifax ahead for a brief period until successive goals by Gordie Cowan, Harvey McDonald and Charlie Marshall sent the Millionaires into the lead as the period ended. McPhee fired his second goal of the night at 8:05 of the third to knot the count. Then Ford's dramatic shot won the game.

Jr. Abbies Defeat Saints 3-0

The Interscholastic Junior Abbies defeated a Saint Dunstan's High School team 3-0 yesterday afternoon in an exhibition game on the S.D.U. field.

Play favored the Abbies during the first half as the school boys forced the play deep into St. Dunstan's territory time after time only to be halted by sometimes kicking on the part of the Saints.

The Abbies efforts finally paid off at the 17 minute mark when Hugh MacLean of Prince Street School picked the ball from behind the Abbies scrum and passed to Jack Kane a Queen Square School athlete who plucked over from the 10 yard line to score the only try of the game.
