## P.C. Candidates Continue Attacks

MOUNT RYAN — Before a large audience at Mount Ryan last evening, J. Russell Driscoll, Conservative candidate in 3rd Queens, criticised the Premier for calling the Diefenbaker adjustment grant of an extra \$10,000,000 "the most stupid arrangement the federal government ever made."

He referred to the time the Premier and delegates went to Ottawa to seek relief from a charge against this province for an overpayment of one-and-a-quarter million dollars and was told by then Prime Minister St. Laurent "that he could pay it back on an instalment basis."

Mr. Driscoll referred to the Young Liberal panel on TV "as absolutely fatal to the party." He also pointed out that in the last year with the Conservative government at Ottawa, tariff reductions had been made so that Canadian potatoes and turnips could now enter the United States at a reduced rate.

He also queried the policy of the present Liberal government in promoting artificial insemination units in the province for the use of cattle owners, and at the same time continuing to import high-priced Holstein bulls for Falconwood Farm, a government-operated farm in connection with Riverside Hospital.

Another speaker last night was Dr. Joseph A. MacMillan who spoke about the hospital plan as having originally been conceived by Paul Martin. He said the plan worked well in Ontario and in Manitoba but Dr. MacMillan added "here, contrary to the wishes of his own Liberal M.L.A.'s, the Premier chose to make it compulsory by Order-in-Council."

"Because of this," he said, "the plan is now compulsory for all farmers, fishermen, laborers in the towns and cities, hence the need for an election before the plan went into operation."

Dr. MacMillan pointed out that politics had changed radically in the federal field therefore a change can be anticipated in the provincial field as well. "SHOVELED A LOT" He concluded by saying "we have a tired old government of 24 years, and we certainly shoveled a lot for the crop we got."

Hon. J. Angus MacLean, the next speaker, who stated emphatically that the money the Island has received from Ottawa since John Diefenbaker took over is not any handout as the Liberals insist, but it is simple justice as the Maritimes are the cornerstone of Canada.

### Polio Cases Rise To 48

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—Two new cases of polio were admitted to the Fever Hospital here Monday, bringing the 1959 total for Newfoundland to 48.

The latest patients are two St. John's boys. A seven-year-old boy from Shearstown and a six-year-old girl from Stephenville were admitted during the weekend.

Thirteen children now are being treated in iron lungs. Three have died since the outbreak started early in June on the Avalon Peninsula.

### Cable Order Is \$7,000,000

LONDON (AP) — A \$7,000,000 order was placed Monday for 1,635 nautical miles of deep-sea cable for the first section of the Commonwealth round-the-world telephone link.

The order was placed with a British firm by Cable and Wireless Limited in collaboration with the Canadian Overseas Telecommunications Corporation.

The cable will be laid between Scotland and Newfoundland in the summer of 1961.

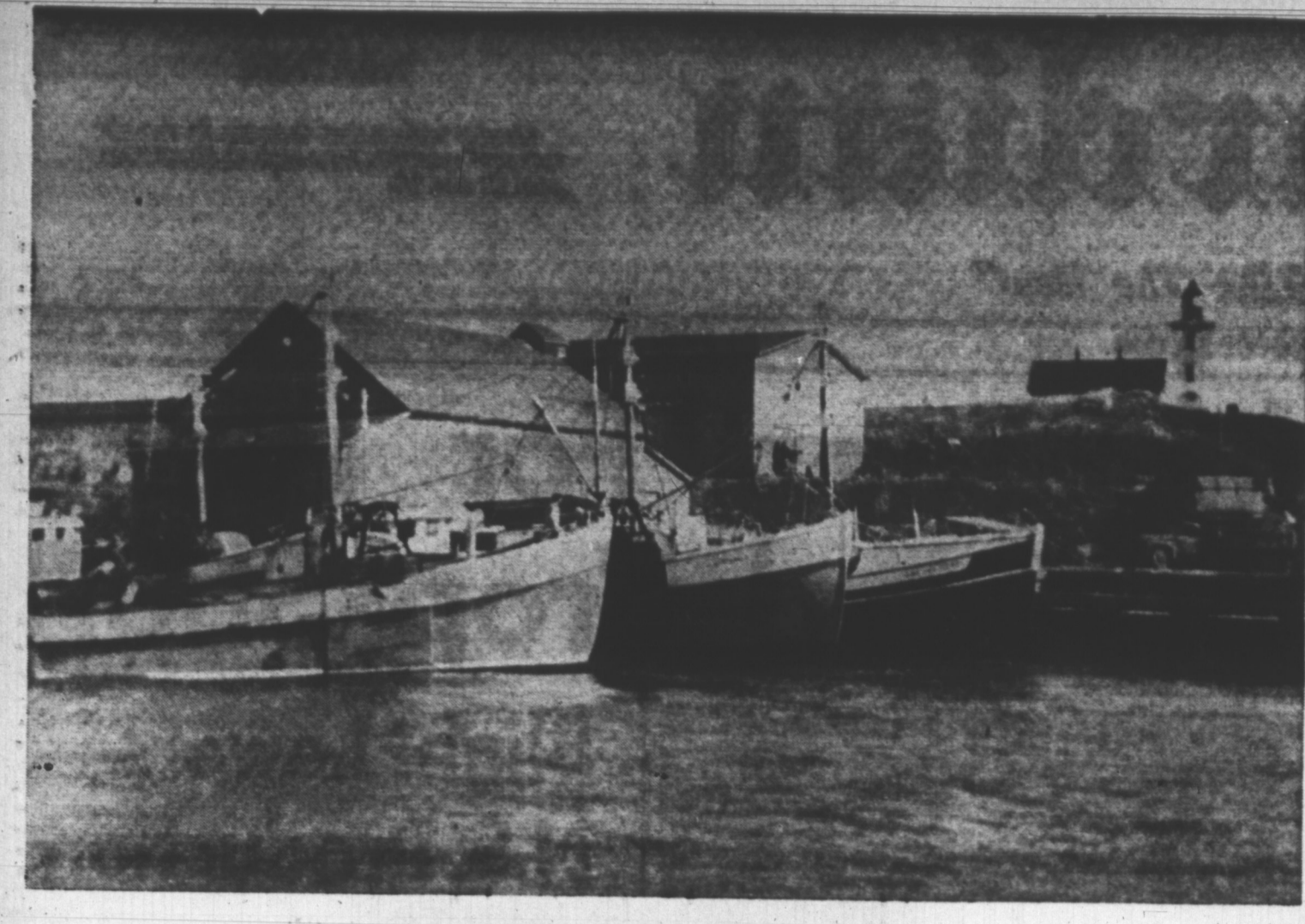

Everything is rounding into shape for the Crapaud Exhibition to be held on Wednesday, August 26th. Livestock entries are equal to that of former years. There is an increased entry in domestic science, perhaps due in large measure to so many prizes having been donated by a large number of interested people.

The majority of old breeders have again placed their entries, together with a large number of new exhibitors. This is very gratifying to the directors of this show as it is evidence of a wider interest in the livestock classes.

There is an increased interest in the dancing classes, and new classes have been added in tap dancing and also for beginners in Highland dancing. These dancing competitions will be held by the Burke-Highland Pipe Band. The directors feel that should the fair be favored with a fine day, it will be one of the most successful shows staged to date at Crapaud.

## Results Of War In Algeria Are Described As 'Pitiful'

By ALAN HARVEY Canadian Press Staff Writer "C'est pitoyable," said the French sergeant's wife. "Pitoyable, pitoyable, pitoyable..." The young Frenchwoman, just back in her homeland after two years in Algeria, was speaking to a Canadian Press reporter of the pitiful human consequences flowing from 4½ years of war in the North African territory.

She was thinking of non-combatant Arabs caught between two fires in a vicious circle of violence, of young French soldiers proudly proclaiming the efficacy of torture in forcing "confessions" from suspected rebels.

The human considerations of which she spoke are important, but have received little publicity. They are likely to be increasingly submerged as President Eisenhower's forthcoming visit to Europe places new emphasis on the political, economic and strategic aspects of the Algerian war.

REALITIES IGNORED? As the world waits for Eisenhower, bickering breaks out between Britain and France. British papers accuse France of a policy of grandeur that bears no relation to power realities, of displaying down the "big two" diplomacy that Britain's Prime Minister Macmillan helped to promote.

A country that has suffered a string of defeats in wars spread over the last 20 years — France is the only country that hasn't stopped fighting since 1939 — accounted for the absence of many from the Clinics. With the result of the first day's clinics 94 less than the objective set it is all the more urgent that there be a 100 per cent attendance at the clinics to be held at the six other centres during the next three days.

Today's clinics are to be at Canoe Cove this afternoon, and at Eldon this evening with an objective of 256 for these two sessions.

## Nurse Division At Springhill Gets Award

HALIFAX (CP) — The Springhill, N.S. nursing division of St. John Ambulance has been awarded the Alice Alberta Ritchie Trophy for outstanding public service, it was announced here Monday night.

The brigade will receive the award for its work during the last Oct. 23 mine disaster that claimed the lives of 75 Springhill miners.

M. H. Sarty, Nova Scotia secretary-commissioner of St. John Ambulance said the award has only been presented twice previously. The greater Winnipeg division received it in 1953 for service during the Winnipeg floods, and the Springhill division received it for work during the 1956 mine disaster. Thirty-nine miners died in that disaster.

The trophy will be presented to the Springhill group later this year.

SUMMERSIDE—William Wendell Larkin Charlottetown was remanded for hearing until Thursday, August 27, when he appeared in Magistrate's Court here yesterday morning before Judge W.E. Darby.

Larkin is charged with break entry and theft at the stores of Athol Cotton and MacKenzies Limited on the night of August 1st.

Wilfred H. Arsenault, Rock Point, pleaded guilty to a charge of impaired driving, which was reduced from driving while intoxicated, and was fined \$100 and costs. RCMP said that there was an accident involved in the case but no details were given.

John James McKie, Enmore, was also fined \$100 and costs after pleading guilty to driving a motor vehicle while impaired near Portage.

## Priests Blamed In Haiti Trouble

PORT AU PRINCE, Haiti (AP) — A government spokesman Monday blamed intervention by French Roman Catholic priests in Haitian politics for friction between church and state in this island nation. He said the whole problem has been referred to the Vatican for settlement.

Presidential Secretary Clement Bardot charged in an interview that certain French priests actively supported political opponents of President Francois Duvalier both before and after Haiti's national election in 1957.

Bardot predicted the friction would end if the Vatican withdrew French - born Archbishop Francois Poirier, 86, head of the Roman Catholic Church in Haiti. He said he believes the Vatican will withdraw him.

The archbishop has been the centre of a controversy which erupted last week with the expulsion of two French priests, Rev. Etienne Grienenberger and Rev. Joseph Marrac. President Duvalier, a Catholic, said they were ousted for reasons of internal security. The two flew to New York on their way to France.

## Loan Policy Is Consistent Says President

TORONTO (CP) — A. C. Ashforth, president of the Toronto Dominion Bank, said Monday the bank will be "consistent" in its lending policy.

He was commenting on remarks made by Prime Minister Diefenbaker last week in Lethbridge, Alta., on the tightening loan situation.

He said it would be necessary to examine closely applications for loans and allocate funds so as to best meet the legitimate borrowing needs of the bank's customers.

Mr. Ashforth also said "close liaison between the chartered banks and the Bank of Canada is desirable especially at this time when we are endeavoring to curb inflationary trends and yet promote the development of our economy."

"Not only is the recession of 1956-57 behind us," he said, "but recovery has proceeded so strongly that we now look forward with confidence to a new period of economic expansion which will bring large increases in aggregate national production and benefit to every part of Canada."

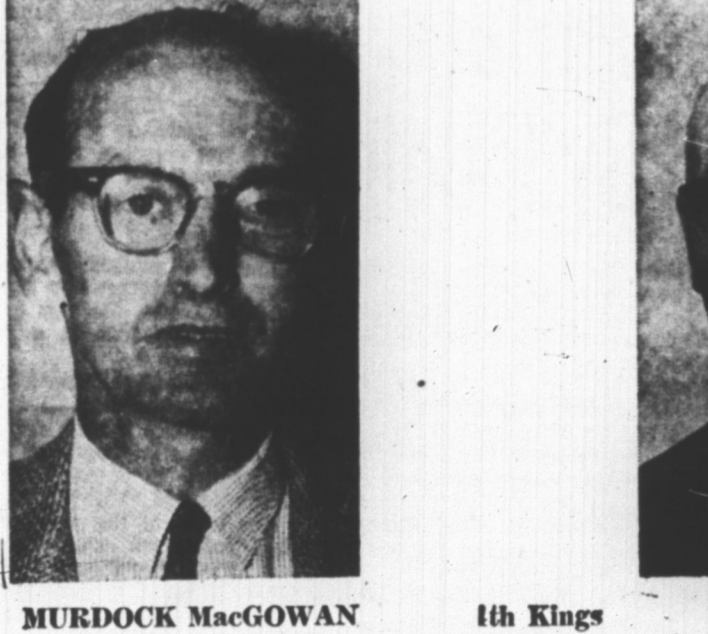
