CHEESE AND BUTTER.

Prospects for Present Season.

Information About Unpaid Balances.

Interview With the Agricultural and Dairy Commissioner on the Outlook in Prince Edward Island.

What is the outlook for the cheese factories on Prince Edward Island for the coming season?

From the light stocks of cheese on hand in the country and in Great Britain, I expect there will be a more active demand for cheese during the summer of 1896 than existed in 1895.

Are the directors and patrons satisfied with the arrangements that have been made?

I fear some of them still prefer that the Government should continue to accept the commercial responsibility of running the factories for them.

With a French-Canadian leader and under the manipulation of such unscrupulous machine politicians as J. D. Edgar et al., I have not the utmost confidence in the future of the Reform party.

What is the Government going to do on the Island this year?

Our Department will undertake the management of ten of the smallest factories, and also the management of two new factories which are being erected.

In addition to the reasons which I gave in the paper letters which were sent to shareholders and patrons of the cheese factories, it is wholly out of the question for the Government to undertake the management of the larger factories on the Island this year.

What about the settlement of the balance on last year's accounts?

I had hoped to be able to get the balances struck by this date, but some small amounts still remain to be adjusted.

As the cheese market last year was the most difficult in which I have knowledge during an experience of some 18 years in the business, I hope the patrons will not be disappointed with the comparatively low returns for the milk for the last season.

Do you expect to visit the Island this season?

Yes, I intend to go there at least twice, and I hope to pay a first visit during or before the last week of May.
