Annual Meeting Held Recently

KENSINGTON — Austin Pendergast, chairman of the board of trustees presided at the annual meeting of the Kensington Regional High School, held on Tuesday evening with an attendance of 35.

A report was heard on the feasibility of consolidated schools for the area. The Kingston board had been approached by the Department of Education with the request that the board look into the possibility of setting up consolidated schools in the district. As a result of the investigation the board recommended two schools, one of which would be the present Kensington Elementary School. A second school would be built adjacent to the Regional High School and the

three schools would use the same bus service.

A motion was passed that each district in the unit be requested to appoint one representative to form a committee. This committee with the addition of two members of the Regional Board will meet at a later date to study the amalgamation of the schools with regard to cost etc.

An option had already been taken on two pieces of land adjoining the Regional school, for future use, and this property will be available for the proposed building.

Dr. R. W. Auld has been appointed to replace Austin Pendergast who has resigned from the board of trustees, and Donald MacKay, representing the Kensington School district, was re-elected for another term of three years. Other trustees are Fred Proffit, James Evans and Leaman Caseley.

Night Shift Employees Terrorized By Gunman

GEORGETOWN — A number of the night shift employees of Bathurst Marine Ltd. in Georgetown reported yesterday that five to seven men were pinned down in an office area where they fled for shelter in the main prefabrication building for between one and a half and two hours in the early hours of yesterday morning by a man who threatened them with a shotgun from a high vantage point atop an overhead crane. A number of shots were fired in the building before and after the employees found shelter in the office and at least one overhead electric light was shot out as the men huddled on the floor of the office.

Finally the men managed to phone town policeman Charles Jackson who summoned five members of the Montague detachment RCMP.

One or two employees, apart from the men in the office, escaped from the building after hiding behind the furnace.

The man with the gun later left the building and ranged through several vacant lots in the area and at one time fired a shot that broke a number of windows in the house occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Leonard De Graze and left pellet marks on the woodwork in the front part of the house.

The police, who were following his movements under searchlights decided to remove their cars from the immediate area, hoping that the man would return to his own home which was also in the area.

The town policeman and one member of the RCMP remained near the house on foot and Const. Jackson entered and hid in the house. A short time after the man entered the house after leaving the gun outside. He was immediately joined by an

RCMP constable who had been watching the house from the outside.

IS CHARGED

Yesterday at noon a Georgetown man was charged before Justice of the Peace J.W. Lavers with possession of an offensive weapon for a purpose dangerous to the public peace.

Dr. G.E. Robinson of Montague, who examined the accused, gave evidence.

The accused was remanded to Riverside Hospital, Charlottetown, until Oct. 19 for examination.

Earlier this year, a Havana woman had quadruplets but all four died.

DIET MANUAL
