Federation Of Agriculture News

Returns Delayed

About twenty five or thirty districts for special reasons have asked for an extension of time in submitting their returns of the marketing vote.

The committee in charge of counting the votes has decided to grant this extension for a few more days in order to get the true picture from as many of those districts as possible.

This is an urgent matter. We cannot emphasize too strongly the need of getting the opinion from the majority of the farmers in every school district on the proposed plan of regulated marketing of potatoes, eggs and poultry. We hope to get some definite assistance from British Columbia in drawing up the details of our plan, explaining it to the authorities and to the farmers at general Federation meetings in each County next spring.

Another marketing meeting will be called to discuss those details as soon as all the returns are in and the results of the Island vote announced.

Apple Growers Helped

The recent announcement of a price support to the Apple growers in Nova Scotia and British Columbia is further proof that the Federal Government is more anxious and can much easier assist producers if they are organized themselves.

In those provinces the apple growers through their own Boards have complete control over their marketing problems. The proposed Board set-up for Maritime potatoes is not so complete. We only propose a regulatory plan. Those apple Boards are organized as a central selling agency doing all business over one desk. Yet, they are organized and their prices and marketing is all under the control of the producers which is the same principle.

British Columbia apple growers have moved about a million and a half boxes of surplus apples out of Canada this year and sold them at a loss in the old country in order to maintain a fair price and a future market at home.

Those people after a long uphill fight for better marketing practices don't hesitate to let it be known to the Maritimes that it is our grown up fault if we are meeting losses. They say if you will organize your own marketing you will have some way of protecting yourselves and will be entitled to greater consideration for price support when surplus problems arise.

Bacon Contract

The present floor price for bacon is supposed to expire on July 1st. It was expected that the United Kingdom contract would be filled before that date but, there has been so little bacon gone forward that there is little possibility of filling the contract by that date.

In this case every effort is being made by the Canadian Federation to have the price support continued until the contract is filled. It is expected that an official announcement will be made soon by the Federal Minister of Agriculture in this respect.

More Hay Trouble

During the past week a couple of more complaints have come in from Upper Canada regarding Island pressed hay. Two more new markets for our hay have been spoiled because some farmers or dealers tried to get away with shipping heated and very low quality hay. It is unfortunate that this year when there is so much good hay available that a few people have to spoil new and quite large markets that have taken so much time and expense to contact.

In one case an order for seventeen carloads has been cancelled. In the other case an outlet for approximately thirty cars has been lost. Some people claim that inspectors and controls are working a hardship on producers but, this is just another instance where the need for some further control is apparently necessary.

Good Seeds

Our Experimental Farm Service

and Department of Agriculture are encouraging the careful selection of seeds of all kinds. We want to stress the seriousness of this matter and give those officials our full support.

Many farmers had the experience during the last few years of an outbreak of serious weeds and poor crops because of buying unregistered turnip seed and sowing seed grains some of which were put through the cleaners and graders two or three times. The little extra paid for high quality seeds in many cases means the difference of a profit or loss on our seasons work.

Fast Treating Successful

The bluestone treatment of popular, fir and other softwood posts has proven most successful over the past few years. The life of such posts may be extended to compete with juniper or even cedar in many cases.

The method of treatment is quite simple. A cement vat or wooden barrel should be used according to the number of posts to be treated. The following details were received from the Experimental Farm outlining the methods used in Western Canada:

Driving posts should be topped and sharpened and all of the surface of the posts that will be below the ground level, and for a few inches above, should be peeled. Also a strip 2 to 3 inches wide should be peeled off the full length of the post. The butt ends of set posts, and the strip up the side are done in the same manner. The posts are placed on end in the vat with the sharpened or butt ends down. If labour is available, complete peeling of the post makes a better job.

Enough water is placed in the vat so that the posts will be standing in 2-3 feet of solution. The bluestone can be dissolved by suspending it in a sack from one corner of the vat. It is best to allow about 24 hours for the bluestone to saturate the water when first starting the solution as bluestone is not very soluble.

Care should be taken to keep enough bluestone in the sack so that a certain amount of the solid substance always remains. This is especially important when adding water to the vat when quantities of posts are being treated and the solution is being used up. This will insure that the solution is saturated.

There is no definite information available as to whether a saturated solution is necessary. Tests are under way to ascertain this fact, but it will be several years before any results will be known, as service records are the only way, at the present time, in which permanence can be estimated. Until information to the contrary is forthcoming, it is recommended to use from 2 to 3 pounds of bluestone per one gallon of cold water, and soak for a period of from 48 to 72 hours and preferably during warm spring days.

Meetings Held Off

Due to bad road conditions the Dairymen's meeting last Saturday had to be postponed. Also the regular meetings of the County Federation directors will be held off until the last week of April.

The provincial Farm Forum committee will also be meeting as soon as possible to wind up the Farm Forum program which has had a most successful year.

During the last few days we have been trying to catch up with a great deal of office and correspondence work, also holding local meetings with officials about current market questions and other farm problems several of which were in our annual brief.
