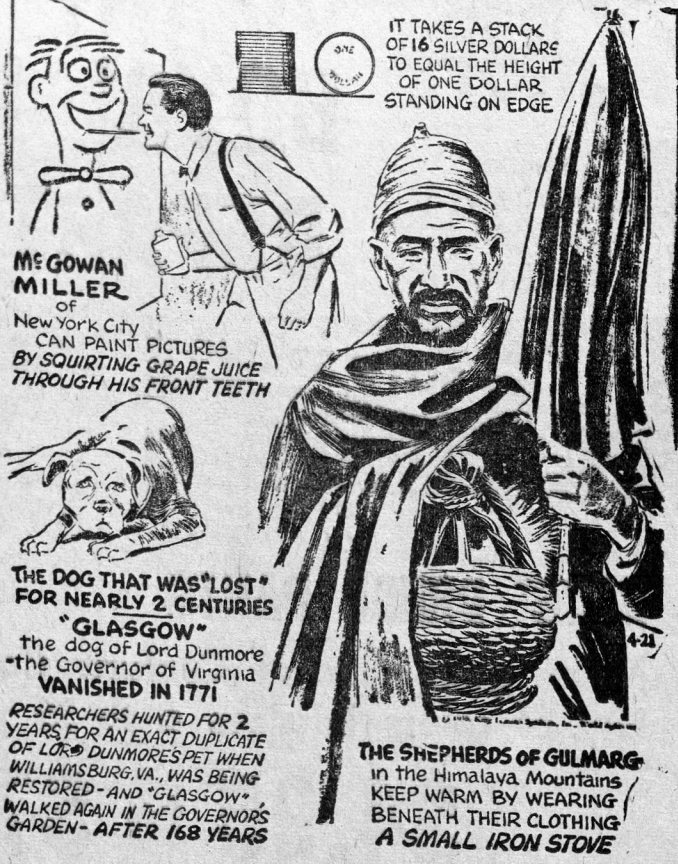

met the defense East and West put on this hand.
West opened his singleton club, the usual lead at most tables. Dummy played the ten, and East, Lee Vernoff, Los Angeles, played the deuce.
Declarer, happy to have saved a club trick, and finding himself in dummy, seized the opportunity to lead the pack of diamonds and take a finesse.
West won the king, and naturally enough, returned a diamond which Mrs. Vernoff trumped. Back came a club, South played the ace, and West ruffed. It was trick number three for the defense.
Another diamond was returned. Declarer, who now realized the club trick he had gained on the opening lead was but a snare and a delusion, trumped with dummy's nine of spades. It availed him naught. East overruffed with the jack—trick number four for the defense.
So declarer went down one. The Greek gift had borne fruit. South's eleven tricks, which at one point had grown to twelve, suddenly shrank to nine.
Having gained a trick when the ten of clubs held, South should have been content to draw trumps, concede a diamond, and call it a day. But if he had, Mrs. Vernoff's imaginative play would have gone unrewarded, and this story could not have been told.

The hand was played last year in the team of four event of the San Francisco Regionals.
But a strange thing happened at one table. South arrived a four spades on the bidding shown—and went down one! What's more, we have an idea quite a few other declarers would have gone down at four spades if they had

Canadian P. M. Hopes West Will Discontinue Bomb Tests

TORONTO (CP)—Prime Minister Diefenbaker said Wednesday night he hopes the West will take a stand "in the immediate future" in favor of halting nuclear weapons tests.

He also promised Canadian willingness "to take any step short of appeasement" which would reduce world tension—provided Russia shows, in diplomatic talks opening today, a genuine desire to achieve results.
Mr. Diefenbaker spoke to the annual dinner of The Canadian Press in his first public address since his party's election victory March 31.

He called for "imaginative statements" from the free world to meet the propaganda of Russia's "intercontinental missiles" — an apparent reference to the recent series of letters from Soviet Premier Khrushchev to Western leaders.

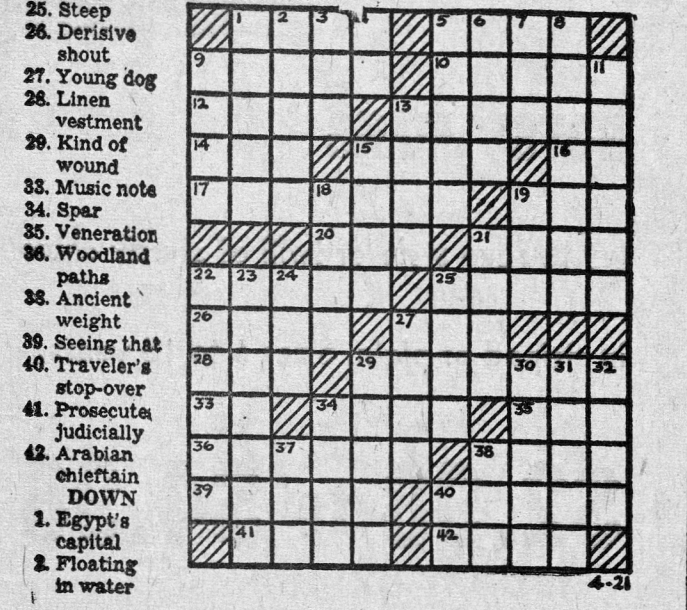
ASKS CANADIAN SUPPORT
Both the United Kingdom and the United States have declined to follow Russia in its announced intention to discontinue nuclear weapons tests. Recently Premier Khrushchev wrote Mr. Diefenbaker asking Canadian support of that intention.
Mr. Diefenbaker, whose reply to the Soviet leader has not yet been sent, said it may be felt it is hypocritical for Mr. Khrushchev to appeal to the conscience of humanity, emphasizing the hazards of nuclear fall-out.
"But it is no answer to these suggestions to label everything that is advanced by the U.S.S.R. as propaganda."
"My hope is that the nations of the free world will announce in the immediate future their desire and willingness to discontinue the tests."
PEACEFUL USES
He suggested, however, that nuclear explosions still might be used for peaceful purposes, using "known explosive techniques," provided there is suitable international supervision.
He referred to suggestions that such blasts might be used underground to restore pressure in depleted oil fields, or for projects similar to the Panama Canal.
Although the practical possibilities of such uses had yet to be assessed "it is apparent that there may be a case for international arrangements to supervise or even to organize nuclear explosions for peaceful purposes."
Turning to the possibility of a summit conference with Russia, which Soviet, U.K. and U.S. diplomats will discuss in Moscow starting today, he said preliminary discussions "should provide a

Metal Is Not From Sputnik

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP)—Strips of metal found recently on a Quebec farm did not come from Russia's Sputnik II, which apparently plunged to its death Sunday night.
The strips which were found by John C. Maguire on his farm near Lennoxville apparently are foil strips used in radar tests, the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory reported Wednesday.
Dr. John B. White, Smithsonian public relations director, said Maguire sent the metal to the observatory in the belief that it may have fallen from the satellite as it whirled over Canada last weekend.

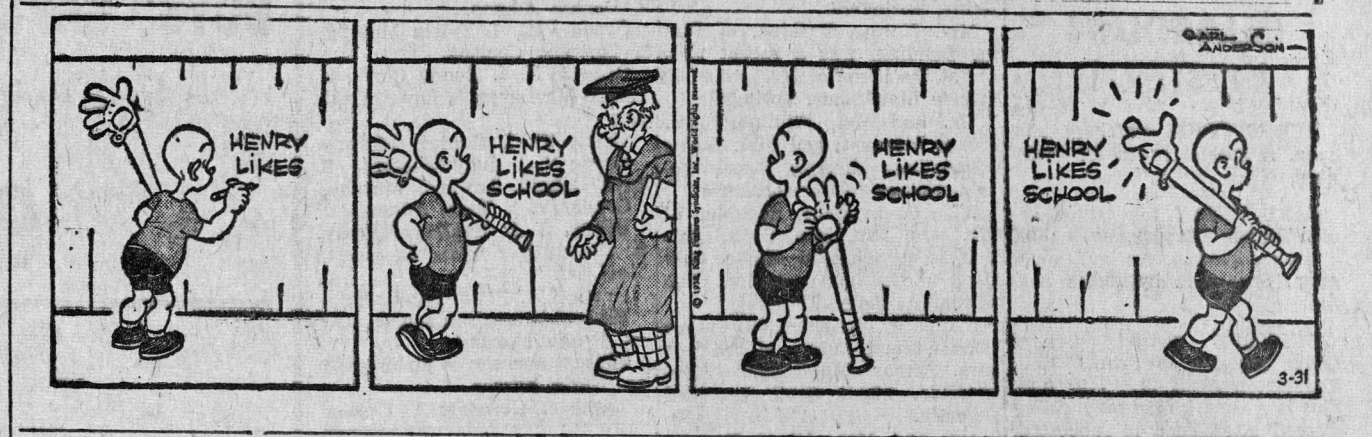
