THE MAINE EXPLOSION.

Reasons Adduced by Spaniards for Concluding that it was Internal.
Lieut. Carranza, the Spanish naval officer now in Toron, recently handed to the Associated Press a statement of facts and conclusions reached by him upon the "Maine" disaster. A portion of the finding was, he claimed, omitted when the article was sent out for publication. He gives a number of instances to prove that the Maine was not blown up from the outside, among which are: No trace of connecting wires nor of a torpedo were found around after the explosion; no dead fish were found; the warships and merchant vessels near the scene of the explosion felt no unusual commotion nor the least movement in the water; the buoy to which the ship was attached remained intact as did the boats of the vessels which were by her side; no cracks were made in the pier, and on the other hand many were discovered in the upper stories of large buildings near the scene and their upper windows were broken; no European service journal or review has attributed the accident to an outside explosion.

Our new hall is approaching completion, the work being pushed rapidly forward by the contractor, Mr. Kennedy. Good Horses Wanted.

The Farmers' Advocate remarks that "a glance at almost any district shows that good horses are not plentiful, and the glaring feature is that good sound draft blood mares are indeed scarce. Were one to go through any district of the country comparatively few good, sound, valuable horses between four and seven years old would be found."

For two reasons, the Advocate continues, all the good mares left in the country should be bred this season: "One for self preservation, as farmers need these young horses as soon as grown to do their farm work, and exporters will need them to keep up the foreign demand, which should not be lost sight of, but should be cultivated and provided for. There is no danger of a glut of good horses in four, five, or ten years. Many of the mares are old, and as some have not bred for four or five years, a large proportion will never breed again. The aim should be to breed large, good horses, and when the foal has arrived feed and care for him well, and thus grow him to his full capacity, instead of a dwarfed chunk of 1,330 to 1,400 pounds, when he might have been made to reach 1,600 in saleable form."
