**THE ELECTIONS.**

Who thought that the people of Canada would vote approval of Tarteism, or of expenditures many millions greater than those which the Liberals of 1896 denounced as outrageously extravagant? Who supposed that all the unfulfilled pledges would be condoned or that the prohibition plebiscite trick would be forgiven? Who imagined for a moment that the people of Canada would vote disapproval of an attempt to obtain Inter-Imperial Preferential trade with its "immense possibilities"? Not the prudent, unprejudiced, independent, patriotic man. Yet these are what the majority of the people of Canada did yesterday.

Certainly it is not wonderful that the Government victory is a great surprise to many persons. But times have been good in Canada as throughout the world. The effects of the Tarteian carnival have not yet been felt. No effort, no expense, was spared by those who hold office in Canada and the Provinces. All the influences of the general and the local governments were combined and used without scruple. Even in these circumstances, there were many Liberals who came out from among them and nobly stood for righteous government. But the majority, though disappointed and deceived, didn't resist the influences; and the government's record of wrong-doing stands "approved."

Among the defeated are Sir Charles Tupper, Mr. Foster and Mr. Hugh John Macdonald. The two latter may confidently look forward to another day. But for the veteran chief of the Liberal-Conservative party, the man who so ably seconded Sir John Macdonald in all the measures adopted for the establishment and consolidation of the Canadian nationality; the man to whom, more than any other, we are indebted for the great railways which bind together the Provinces of Canada extending from the Atlantic to the Pacific, we fear that another opportunity to serve his country in its government will not be offered. A dozen other constituencies will, doubtless, be offered him. But, at his great age, he will not, perhaps, care to continue in the leadership of the Opposition—particularly as his son, Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper, is in the race for the position, and may obtain it.

The defeat of Mr. McDonald and Mr. Hackett was a genuine surprise. Whether on the government side of House or on the opposition, these gentlemen are capable of doing good service for the country, and upon this account, as well as upon their personal account, we greatly regret that they were not elected. Mr. Stewart had, admittedly, an opponent who is personally popular, and who as Minister of Marine and Fisheries wields great influence. So that his defeat is not wonderful—especially when we remember the unusually great efforts put forth to secure it. Mr. Stewart is, however, a comparatively young man and he

can afford to await the turn of the wheel while he, in the meantime, strengthens his position in the riding. We have to congratulate Mr. Lefurkey on his substantial majority in the Bedeque district; and it is pleasing to note that Mr. Martin's again elected, even though it is by a very narrow majority. It is said that there were not enough ballots at several of the polls in which Mr. Martin expected majorities and that his majority was reduced upon that account.

In the hour of defeat prepare for victory. We hope that this motto will, at once, be acted upon by the Conservative party. There should, as soon as possible, be reorganization, and a policy adopted to meet the new conditions, and young men of ability, in the party, should be encouraged to come forward and enlist in the country's service. It is useless to depend upon the splendid record of the past. The party must be in a position to grapple successfully with the problems of the present and the future. To this end, it is now sufficiently evident, reorganization is essential.
