THE STANLEY.—The Stanley left Georgetown at the usual time this morning.

THE MAILS.—Crossing both ways today. The mail special arrived in town at a quarter past twelve.

ST. PETER'S CATHEDRAL.—The Rev. Marcell Conran will deliver addresses to girls and young women daily this week at 4 p. m. He will also preach each evening at 7.30. Children's service daily 5 p. m. t.

A BAD LOSS.—We regret to learn by private letter from Dawson City that the Messrs Palmer, sons of Donald Palmer, Esq., of Crapud, were heavy losers by the recent fire in Dawson. They were doing a mercantile business under the firm name of Palmer Bros. Their loss is said to be \$10,000, with no insurance.

THE GASPESIA AGAIN.—An Ottawa despatch says: Montague Yates, manager of the Canadian Steamship Company, the Milford Haven-Paspebiac line, is here. He says the company has demonstrated the practicability of operating a ten-month service to Paspebiac, and will run vessels continuously to that port all through the summer, and in winter, when the state of the ice will permit. The company has no fears with respect to the Gaspesia, except that she may now be running short of provisions. There are about 75 persons on board, passengers and crew. The government steamer Stanley has been ordered to the relief of the Gaspesia, and is left to the discretion of the captain as to when he shall go.

ST. DUN TAN'S CATHEDRAL.—The Holy Week services in the Cathedral commence this evening at 7 o'clock with the office of Tecebrae. To-morrow morning at 8 o'clock there will be a Pontifical High Mass and the blessing of the oils. On Friday morning at 8 o'clock there will be the unveiling of the cross, and on Saturday morning at 7.30 the blessing of the Easter water. The office of Tecebrae will be sung each evening at 7 o'clock, with the exception of Saturday.

THOMAS D'ARCY MCGEE.—There was a good audience of Foresters and their friends in Prowse's new hall last evening to hear Mr. McCready deliver his lecture on "Thomas D'Arcy McGee." The lecture was highly interesting, and was well delivered. The vote of thanks at the close was moved by the Rev. W. J. Kirby and seconded by Mr. S. F. Hodgson. After the lecture interesting addresses on Forestry were given by High Chief Ranger Clarke and High Secretary Fowler.

HALIFAX COURT SCENE.—At Halifax a few days ago the grand jury returned four true bills against James Jackson for criminal assault. Judge Graham decided not to permit anyone in the court room during the present session, except lawyers, witnesses and reporters. The judge ordered the sheriff to clear the crowd out of the building. It took ten officers to execute the order. Some of the loafers showed fight and the constables and tongs went down in a heap. Others were dragged from the building, and several constables tumbled down stairs.

A FATAL ACCIDENT.—There arrived by the steamer Stanley on Tuesday, the 21st inst., the body of Stephen McKinnon, who was killed by a blow from a skid crushing his skull whilst engaged in unloading timber at a lumber camp, near Greenville, Maine, on the 14th inst. The above was the son of the late Hugh and Margaret McKinnon, of McAskill's River, Lot 42. He resided with his friends at Rollo Bay until some 15 years ago when he went to the United States and engaged in the lumber business, which he followed every winter since, working on a farm in summer for Messrs Morrison & Co., of Roach River. The deceased was 45 years of age and unmarried. His remains were received at Georgetown by his friends, and conveyed to Rollo Bay, where they were interred on Wednesday, the 22nd. A Requiem High Mass was sung by Rev. A. Walker, and all that was mortal of poor Stephen was laid in the quiet little cemetery of St. Alexis, deservedly and truly regretted by a large circle of friends and acquaintances. His quiet and unassuming manner had endeared him to all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance. His friends wish to take this opportunity of publicly expressing their heartfelt thanks to Messrs. Morrison & Co., of Roach River, also to two gentlemen in Greenville who interested themselves in his remains, but more particularly to Mr. John McKinnon, who accompanied the body and who never left his trust until he saw the last clod of earth placed on his friend's grave.
