Activities Of Farm Loan Board

Farm loans through the Canadian Farm Loan Board for this Province amounted to \$185,050 for the year ending March 31, 1950, according to figures appearing in the Board's annual report, issued at Ottawa.

This total is comprised of 94 first mortgages and 13 seconds, and covers a total of 9,857 acres. Estimated total value of security for these loans is \$436,057. Prince Edward Island shows the second lowest total of loans received from the Farm Loan Board, Nova Scotia being the lowest with a total of \$108,250 for the same period.

For all Canada during the year ending March 31, 1950, the Board approved \$5,189,400 in loans, over sixty percent of this amount being for the purchase of land and the refinancing of land secured debt. The amount approved represents a small increase over the previous year and is the largest annual volume of business in the last 13 years.

TRAFFIC CHECK — City Police made a traffic check at the corner of Grafton and Queen streets yesterday and arrived at a total of 7,432 vehicles crossing this intersection, according to figures released last evening by Police Chief C. W. MacArthur. The test was conducted from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. and shows an average of 743 an hour, or a little better than 12 a minute. The traffic check was conducted by the use of complometers, and apparently is to determine the necessity of traffic lights.

WOODSMEN and others.
