**Sea Products Valued At \$4,484,000 In '61**

Final figures for the province's 1961 fishing season show that the landed value of all sea products was \$4,484,000, made up of 38,521,000 pounds of sea fish, and 23,600,000 pounds of sea moss.

Last season's landed value of sea products was about \$1,360,000, or less than the 1960 figure, when 22,200,000 pounds of fish and 21,500,000 pounds of Irish moss brought a landed value of \$4,940,000.

Greatest value was in lobster landings, which were 9,300,000 pounds, having a value of \$3,056,000. In 1960, lobster landings, valued at \$3,212,000, were 10,138,000 pounds.

Landings of Irish moss were up last year over 1960. Last year's landing was 23,600,000 pounds at a value of \$313,000; in 1960, 12,500,000 pounds at a value of \$161,000 were landed.

In releasing the figures yesterday, Fisheries Minister Leo Rosatier said the lower lobster catches this year could be attributed to a later starting season because of ice conditions last spring.

"Even though it was a late start," said Mr. Rosatier, "I think we had a very good season and I am looking forward to an even better season this year."

**Changes In Civil Service Act Proposes New Commission**

Development of a Provincial Civil Service Commission, patterned after the federal organization which controls the employment of employees in all government departments, is expected as a result of legislation that will likely be introduced at the session of the provincial legislature which opens here this afternoon.

One source close to the government suggested it would remove political influence from the employment of civil servants, would introduce job evaluation, and result in greater efficiency in the service, because of competition for jobs, based on the applicant's ability and experience.

The federal civil service has virtually complete control of placements in the government service, and political affiliation is not considered in evaluating the applicant's qualifications for the job that is being sought.

This province has had a Civil Service Act for many years, and an employee's position has been free from political influence, for the most part, once employment has been attained. But the original employment is controlled by the party in power with the emphasis often being placed more on the applicant's political background than on training and experience.

**Quebec Legislature Member Blasts Secessionist Group**

MONTREAL (CP) — Frank Hanley, independent member of the Quebec legislature, has dubbed leaders of Quebec's secessionist movements as "false saviors" whose work will damage French-Canadian more than help them.

He said these men try to convince the French-Canadian he is exploited by English-Canadians but in many cases the exploitation by French-Canadians of their own people is worse.

"I wonder why it is that the French-Canadian workingman prefers to work for an English-speaking concern?" Mr. Hanley asked. "Is it because, as I believe, many a French-Canadian capitalist exploits his French-Canadian labor?"

"I wonder where the French-Canadian philanthropists are? Do they feel their help is unnecessary because in many places throughout the province English-speaking philanthropists are financing the recreational centres and other facilities for French-Canadians?"

HALIFAX (CP)—The weather office says a disturbance is forecast to pass to the south of Nova Scotia tonight. Snowfall amounts of five to 10 inches are estimated for all but northern New Brunswick, where two to six inches are anticipated. The snow should begin in the southern parts of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia in the morning and spread through the remainder of the district during the day.

Regional forecasts:  
Halifax and vicinity, northern Nova Scotia, Eastern Shore, Eastern N.B. counties, Upper St. John River Valley: Cloudy with snow beginning in the afternoon; little change in temperature; light winds increasing by evening to southeast 15. Low-high at Halifax 15 and 30, New Glasgow and Goshen 5 and 30, Moncton 3 below and 25 above, Edmundston 5 below and 20 above.

South Shore, Annapolis Valley, Lower St. John River Valley: cloudy with snow beginning around noon; colder; light winds increasing by evening to southeast 15. Low-high at Yarmouth 15 and 32, Kentville 5 and 30, Fredericton 5 below and 25 above, Saint John zero and 23.

Cape Breton, Prince Edward Island, Bay of Chaleur: Mostly clear, clouding over in the afternoon with snow beginning in the evening; colder; light winds. Low-high at Sydney 5 and 28, Charlottetown 3 below and 28 above, Campbellton 5 below and 20 above.

Bay of Fundy: Light winds increasing in afternoon to southeast 15 and in the evening to southeast 25; cloudy with snow beginning in the morning. Visibility 10 miles lowering in snow to one to three miles and occasionally to one-quarter mile; little change in temperature.
