PROVINCIAL RAILWAYS.—The Hon. Mr. Fisher, H. M. Attorney General, arrived from England by the steamer at Halifax last week.

THE SHIPPING TRADE.—We make the following extracts from the Circular of Messrs. Seymour, Peacock, & Co.:

"There have been during the past year some very severe losses by shipwreck, and we doubt if the quantity of new tonnage coming forward will be able to keep pace with the requirements of our vastly increasing trade, particularly of the smaller class of vessels, from 200 to 300 tons.

"We therefore look forward to a good demand for tonnage, under any political circumstances, at remunerative rates, and to and from all friendly parts of the world, and although peace would be desirable, could it be obtained on terms the nation has a right to demand, yet, in a local point of view, the loss to the British shipping interest in the Russian trade has scarcely been felt."

THE LIQUOR LAW.—A private letter from Miramichi states, that the Sessions of Northumberland lately appointed two Agents for the sale of Liquor in that County, one at Newcastle and one at Chatham, and authorised the County Treasurer to borrow fifty pounds for each Agent, to lay in a stock of Liquors.

Our correspondent at St. Stephen, writing under date of the 6th, says:—"The Prohibitory Law gives much dissatisfaction. Several cases have been tried before our unwieldy Magistrates, and all but one failed."

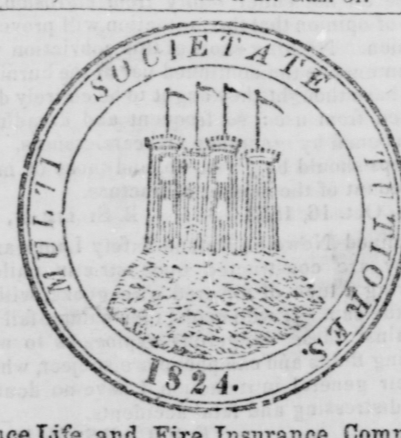
