

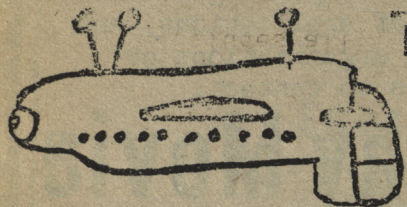

Throughout the years however, the beaver also gained recognition as an industrious, hardworking, and lovable critter. The beaver has become a favourite for Engineers because it is so characteristic of Engineers who are also constructive, industrious, and/or lovable.

The beaver grew in importance in Canada as a symbol for the Engineering profession. In light of this, I asked around for someone to draw a picture of the noble beaver. I received two replies, each of which explain clearly how to draw a beaver. Why don't you follow the instructions and draw the beaver yourself.

METHOD # ONE (incidentally from an artsie) - "Deposit one's hand into one's pocket or purth and deftly clutch a 5¢ piece, more popularly known as a nickel. Plath the nickel faith down (the queen's of corth(hee hee(ooph, it makes me giggle))) on a desk, table, or similar object, the product of some noble craftsman who has toiled many hours. Where was I? ...Oh yes... Plath a sheet of paper over the nickel, then

gently, as a summers breeze over a flowery meadow, shade the area over the nickel with a lead pencil. VOILA!! A beaver appears on the paper before your very eyes."

METHOD # TWO(Engineer, by the way) - "Take a standard 8 1/2 by 11 sheet of paper. Using a soft lead(HB or F), draw with the aid of a straight edge, a 3 inch vertical line centred in the lower half of the paper. At a point 1/2" from the top of the line, draw(with the aid of a protractor) two 3" lines radiating outward and upward(to the left and right of the point) at an angle of 45° with the vertical. Mark a point approx. 2" up on these two lines. Join the two points with a horizontal line. The resultant figure may be shaded in for extra clarity(an Ames lettering guide is handy). Remember to draw construction lines with a 2H or harder and object line with a soft lead. The beaver may be coloured to suit your taste as well; brown, black, red and yellow are good colours. Green and blue of course indicate your meat is spoiled, and are generally as a rule, not acceptable in drawing beavers."

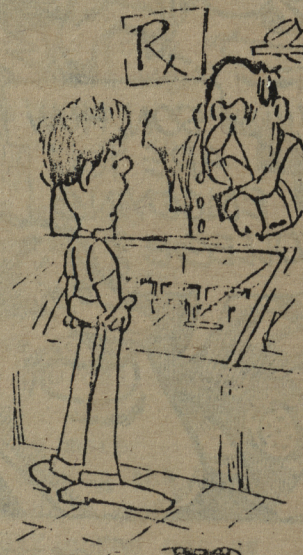
Quite a piece of graphical design; sure is a lot different than drawing tits with your compass all day.
