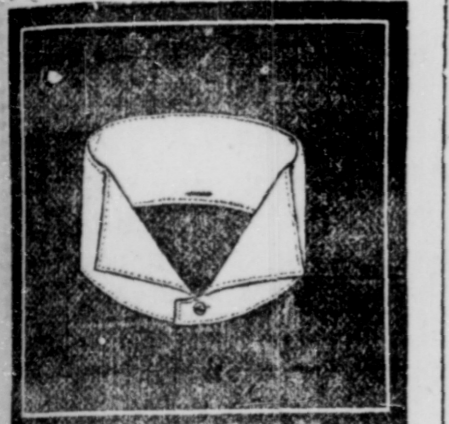

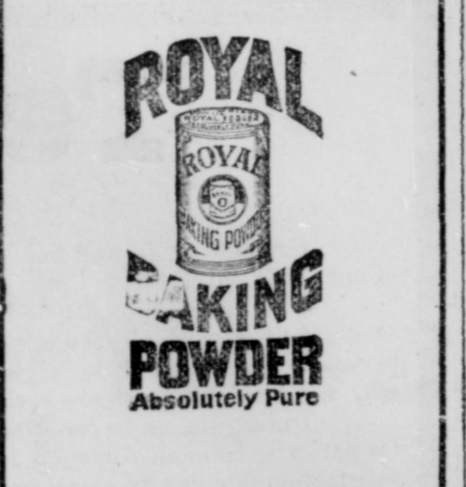

Temperance Alliance.

The annual meeting of the Temperance Alliance was held an evening or two ago. The attendance was very good, and eight new members were received.

The report of the Secretary reviewed the year's work showing what had been done by the Alliance to promote the interests of temperance and morality. The report was adopted.

Officers were then elected as follows: President, J. D. Seaman; vice-presidents, W. T. Huggan and G. E. Full; Sec'y, C. W. Corey; treas, J. K. Ross. The executive consists of the officers, all city clergymen signing the constitution and five others to be appointed by the annual meeting. In the latter case selection was made of J. A. Lawson, J. J. Chappel, R. C. Goff, H. Rackham, and W. H. Long.

An amendment to the constitution makes the executive also to embrace a representative of the Salvation Army and each temperance society of the city.

After some discussion on the question of local prohibition, arising from the reading of a letter written by Sir L. H. Davies declaring the prohibition of the sale of alcoholic liquors as a beverage to be within the power of the province the following resolution was unanimously passed:

"In view of the fact that the plebiscite vote on the prohibition for the Dominion will be taken in the near future, and in view of the possibility of there being a prohibitory law enacted for the Dominion: Be it therefore resolved that we as the C. T. Alliance do not ask for immediate local prohibition. Further resolved that should there not be enacted in the near future by the Dominion legislation such a law, we make an organized effort in connection with the temperance organizations throughout the island, to secure local prohibition of the sale of liquor as a beverage."

"Resolved that the committee appointed to draft the sewer bill now before the Legislature are hereby authorized to withdraw said bill on account of the very material changes made in its provision.

"Resolved that in the event of the Legislature not allowing the Council to withdraw the bill or refusing to pass the original bill that His Worship the Mayor be authorized to call a public meeting of the citizens in the Market Hall to consider the bill as amended. Carried unanimously."
