Court At Souris Deals With Heavy Docket

SOURIS — Kings County Court was held at Souris yesterday afternoon with Magistrate James B. Johnston, Q.C., presiding. The Crown was represented by J. Arthur McGuigan, deputy attorney-general.

William James Jarvis of Elmira on a charge of driving while his abilities were impaired by alcohol, pleaded guilty and was fined \$100 and costs or 10 days.

Roy Edward Bell, Montague, pleaded guilty to a charge of theft of 25 pounds of lobsters, valued at less than \$50, the property of Leon Johnstone, Montague, and received a suspended sentence of two years and ordered to enter into a recognizance of \$500 plus one surety of \$500. He was also ordered to make restitution to Mr. Johnstone.

Peter John Stubbert of Souris on a charge of arson was released on a Lieutenant-Governor's warrant and will be confined in Riverside Hospital for an indefinite period.

Ralph Eugene MacKinnon, St. Peters appeared on two charges. The first was driving while his license was suspended and the other that of being the driver of a vehicle involved in an accident with damage of over \$100 and failure to report said accident. Both cases were adjourned to Charlottetown on June 20.

Bernard Alphonse McCormack, New Zealand, on a charge of common assault, pleaded guilty and was fined \$20 and costs or 10 days.

William Sullivan Carter, Souris, charged with causing a disturbance by being drunk in the Town of Souris had his case adjourned to Georgetown on June 20.

Charles Henry Mallard, Govan Brae, pleaded guilty to a charge of having liquor not purchased at a vendors and was fined \$25 and costs or 30 days.
