Baha'i Theatre Lecturer Discusses World Affairs

Dr. Firuz Kazemzadeh wears a coat of many colors. He was born in Moscow shortly after the Bolshevik revolution of a Persian father and a Russian mother.

His family was at once two things — in the diplomatic service and of the Baha'i faith, the newest major religion in the world. From this unusual background was woven the first threads of that coat.

Sixteen years went by while his father remained in the Iranian Embassy. Here young Firuz went to a Russian school and learned the language of today's great giant power.

Then he finally returned to Tehran for four years, at the end of which the youth travelled to the United States for higher education. Stamford University brought a BA and MA in History, and in 1950 the young scholar received his PhD from Harvard.

During those first 26 years of life Dr. Firuz Kazemzadeh held onto the religion which has brought oppression and persecution to untold thousands during its 100 years of existence, most of which stemmed from the country of its inception, Iran.

PROFESSOR AT YALE

Since that time 14 years ago when Dr. Kazemzadeh began his domestication in America, he has become professor of history at Yale, author of a scholarly text, and a recognized authority on Russian and Middle Eastern history — and one other thing: chairman of the non-scientific National Spiritual Assembly of the Baha'is in the U.S.

For several days Dr. Kazemzadeh has been in Charlottetown visiting the handful of local Baha'is. Last night he lectured in a Confession Centre on "The New Road to World Unity," a Baha'i faith admits it borrows from all other major religions. Its aim is world peace, world peace, world brotherhood, claims the doctor. It admits no such things as superiority of races, and condemn racism everywhere.

These things Dr. Kazemzadeh has been saying to those who listen since he came here. He also expressed views on a number of problems in both East and West.

On Coldwater: "He is retreating to the 19th century where he doesn't have to worry about facing the real problems of today."

On communism: "Its originators thought that if they took away all private property conflict would disappear, and the problem of the world with it. It is obvious how much conflict has disappeared."

On democracy: "It is only a way of carrying on an organization, of doing something — only a way, a means, and not an end."

On ecumenism: "This is the aim of the Baha'is, to unite all true religions, to admit that no religion is unique in itself, but that all are part of a common, optimistic, that relations between the two great powers are improving and will continue to improve, to the point where understanding takes over for the H-bombs, and to where the present problem will no longer exist."

\$5,000 Bail Set On Hit, Run Charge

SUMMERSIDE — Derwin Bell Heustis of Cape Traverse was remanded with a \$5,000 bail on a charge of hit and run yesterday morning on the charge of criminal negligence.

Nine Witnesses Cited At MacInnis Inquest

At an inquest last evening a coroner's jury decided that the death of Duncan Alban MacInnis in Sydney, N.S., witnessed on the night of June 27-28 as the result of the deceased being struck by a 1963 Ford station wagon.

A charge has already been laid in court in the case against the driver, Kevin Higgins, of Stanhope. Higgins was present at the inquest but with the advice of his counsel J.P. Nicholson, made no statement.

There were nine witnesses called before coroner J.P. Nicholson. Dr. Andrew Aquino, assistant provincial pathologist, stated that his examination revealed that the body had many fractures to both legs. A blood test revealed that the deceased had been drinking.
