Court action can be taken against any man who deserts his wife and family and skips to another Province without the presence of the man or without a service of notice on him under the provisions of a bill entitled "The Reciprocal Enforcement of Maintenance Orders Act" which was given second reading in the Legislature yesterday.

The bill enables the Attorney-General in one Province to submit orders to the Attorney-General in another Province with regard to cases concerning the support of a wife and family.

Mr. D. L. Matheson raised the objection that under the Act the man might receive improper defense in the case where he were absent from the trial.

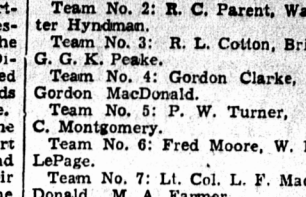
