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Provincial Rose Show July 16 To Include Centennial Aspect

Once again it is Rose Show time and the members of Paradise Women's Institute are busy with the hundreds and one details that make the show run smoothly.

As usual, it is being held in the Paradise Women's Institute Hall. The date is Thursday July 16, and everyone, members and exhibitors alike, is hoping that the rainy weather will yield to sunshine to give the roses the necessary spurt of abundant bloom in time for the show.

Interest centers, as usual around the challenge trophy, the Eben Arnfast Memorial Rose Bowl awarded annually to the exhibitor showing the best hybrid tea rose of the show. There are many other awards and prizes in the varied prize list, which includes a special class, open to first year exhibitors only. This class is aimed to promote interest among gardeners and encourage the novice to exhibit.

In keeping with the theme of Centennial year, the Institute members working on the exhibits will be dressed in Centennial costumes. An added attraction will be an old fashioned booth where lemonade and "grandma's" sugar cookies will be sold. It is hoped to use old fashioned roses for decoration around this booth.

The exhibits are arranged in the morning. After 3 p.m. the show is open to the public. The evening's entertainment, with special speaker and presentation of awards, begins at 8:30 p.m. After 9:30 the roses are sold at very normal prices so that anyone who wishes may take home a tangible souvenir of what is expected to be a very interesting day.

Georgetown Day Plans Progress

GEORGETOWN — As Georgetown's Centennial Day, to be celebrated on July 22, draws closer, the finalizing of the day's events is reaching fever pitch and at a meeting of the Centennial Committee held on Tuesday night in the Town Hall, many problems were discussed and final decisions made to insure the success of the big day's events.

It was decided that the parade will be assembled in an area at the entrance of the town and that visiting floats will be met on the main road and directed to the assembly area.

The parade is scheduled to move off at 10 a.m. The exact route is yet to be decided but will be laid before the next meeting of the committee on July 15.

It was decided to have the town crier, give an announcement regarding Georgetown's Day, when he attends the band concert to be held this evening at Brudenell Park.

Reports from several committees showed that good progress is now being made in the preparation of the float and that many citizens have signified their intentions to place colored lights on the outside of their homes.

On Wednesday night the members of the centennial committee and their wives motored to Charlottetown, where they were guests at the Pierre Berton program at the Memorial Theatre.

Work was reported going ahead on the facilities for the track and field events and also evening events. Physical fitness officials have agreed to assist in handling and providing equipment for track and field.

Premier Shaw Urges Further Enheat Work

Prime Minister Pearson and the department of defense production will be receiving telegrams from Premier Shaw urging the further granting of urgent repair contracts to leave the Charlottetown plant of Enxamel and Heating Products Limited in operation.

Present contracts run out by September 30, and it is feared that the lack of further contracts will result in the closing of the plant.

Premier Shaw said that the telegrams pointed out the economic importance to the province of the plant, and asked that steps be taken to prevent closing and the resultant lack of jobs for "well-qualified" personnel.

New Stamp To Honor Ch'town Meet

Postmaster J.R. Nicholson announced yesterday a new five-cent postage stamp commemorating the 100th anniversary of the 1864 pre-confederation conference at Charlottetown will be released July 26.

The new stamp will be printed in black and white by a steel engraving process and will portray the new Fathers of Confederation Memorial Building.

At the left of the stamp will be the provincial building where the meeting was held.

The stamp was based on suggestions submitted by Phillip Weis of Ottawa who has designed a number of other Canadian postage stamps.

It was detailed and engraved by the Canadian Bank Note Company Ltd.

Montague To Receive \$75,000

Montague is due to receive \$75,000 in grants from the Atlantic Provinces Development Board for a water supply system and road paving, according to an announcement by the board at Ingonish Beach, N.S.

Board chairman Ian MacCormack, president of the United Baptist Convention of the Atlantic Provinces and pastor of the West End Baptist Church, Halifax, N.S., will be the guest speaker at the First Baptist Church, Charlottetown, Sunday, July 12. Rev. MacCormack is a native of Yarmouth, N.S. He has contributed articles to the devotional booklet, "The Secret Place, a number of times.

Brudenell Band Concert Planned Tonight

MONTAGUE — The Central RCMP Band from Ottawa now visiting the province will perform tonight at Brudenell Park commencing at 7:30 p.m.

The Montague Regional Strawberry Festival committee has made all arrangements for this concert with Peter Simpson as chairman. A suitable platform has been erected at Brudenell for the band and in the event of rain the concert will be held in the Montague Regional High School auditorium.

There will be no charge for this concert, but a silver addition will be taken up by the contestants for strawberry queen.

The band is famous all over Canada and has come to Montague on special invitation from the strawberry festival committee. The concert is expected to be an excellent one and it is hoped that it will be widely attended by music lovers.

Distance Swim Entries Close This Saturday

MONTAGUE — A special feature of the Lower Montague Regatta this year will be the long distance swim on Wednesday July 15. Contestants must have their applications in by Saturday to Mrs. Arthur Sullivan, Montague.

This swim will be 1.6 miles from the Georgetown marine wharf to the regatta at Lower Montague. All contestants, oarsmen and life guards should be at the wharf at 12 noon with the race starting at approximately 1 p.m.

Members of the Red Cross Water Safety Commission will be in attendance as will a RCMP patrol boat. Prizes will be awarded, with \$25 for first place, \$15 for second and \$10 for third.

The 50 guides then toured the town of Souris and the two fish filleting plants, Ulen and Easton Fisheries, before journeying to Montague.
