Help For Multiple Sclerosis Patients Says Neurologist

MONTREAL, (CP) — Multiple sclerosis patients can be helped, Montreal neurologist Dr. Reuben Rabinovitch told a rally meeting of the Montreal association for multiple sclerosis Tuesday night.

He said medical authorities were about as close to an answer about the disease as they can be without actually finding it.

Multiple sclerosis is a disease in which damage to the central nervous system impairs walking, speech, hearing and eyesight. Its cause and its cure remains unknown.

Dr. Rabinovitch found hope in that means of diagnosing the disease now were much clearer.

He said it was also found that the life span of multiple sclerosis patients was close to that of normal persons. The erroneous idea that all at a patient affected with the disease could do was slowly die in a wheel chair or in his bed, was losing ground.
