

Local and Other Items.

A TREAT.—The splendid music furnished by the Citizens Band on Queen Square last evening was much appreciated by the large number of people present.

TO-NIGHT.—Service in the Second Methodist Church at 7.30. Several of the Ministerial brethren who are attending the annual financial meeting in the city will be present.

BROKE JAIL.—A man named Hector Douglas broke out of Pictou jail a few nights ago by crawling through a 7 x 13 opening in the window. He is supposed to have made his way over here.

HOUSE BURNED.—The dwelling house of Charles Robertson, Annandale, Lot 56, was burned to ashes one night last week. The occupants had a narrow escape. A defective flue is supposed to have been the cause of the fire. There was no insurance.

KICKED BY A HORSE.—An eleven year old boy, named James, was severely injured about the head and face as a result of being kicked by a horse which, it is said, he was trying to catch in a pasture on the St. Peter's road, late yesterday afternoon. He was driven home by Rev. A. J. McIntyre, of Tracadie, who happened to be passing at the time. Dr. S. R. Jenkins dressed the wounds, and the little fellow is now doing well.

LAWN TENNIS.—The competing teams in the inter-provincial lawn tennis tournament, which began at Victoria Park this forenoon, arrived last evening and are stopping at the Hotel Davies. The match games consist of ladies' doubles, ladies' singles, ladies' and gentlemen's doubles, gentlemen's doubles and gentlemen's singles. The play will be continued to-morrow and Wednesday. The visitors will be entertained at a ball at Mrs. Bartlett's this evening, and another at Gov. Stewart House by the local club on Thursday evening.

FIRE.—The stable of Mr. Thomas Connolly, situated in the rear of his residence, Sidney Street, was destroyed by fire between 12 and 1 o'clock this morning. When the fire was discovered the building was in a blaze. How the fire started is a mystery. Mr. Connolly was last in the stable between seven and eight o'clock in the evening, and when he came out made the door fast with a hasp—the usual way. There was then no sign of fire about the place. A quantity of hay and straw, and a sleigh and set of harness stored in the building were destroyed. The firemen were rung up by means of the electric alarm in their houses, and as a result many of them were on their way to the scene of the fire before the general alarm was sounded. Owing to their exertions, and the plentiful supply of water, the fire was confined to the building in which it originated. Mr. Connolly estimates his loss at \$200. The building was insured for \$50.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Mrs. Maybrick's Sentence.

NEW YORK, Aug. 19. A special from London to the Herald, signed by "A Member of Parliament," says: "No decision has yet been arrived at by the Home Secretary in regard to the sentence passed on Mrs. Maybrick. That the duty of deciding so dreadful a question should fall upon the Home Secretary is one of the greatest drawbacks of the office, which is seldom a bed of roses. The abuse which has been heaped upon him is wholly undeserved, for he has given the most conscientious consideration to all the facts of the case with a sole desire of seeing that justice is done. Unless some new phase of the case should occur adverse to Mrs. Maybrick (which is scarcely probable) her life is nearly certain to be spared." Rev. Mr. Spurgeon writes to the newspapers to say that he will sign a petition for the release of Mrs. Maybrick, and will commend to his congregation the advisability of following his example.

Forest Fires.

HELENA, Mont., Aug. 19.

The forest fires which have been raging all over Montana for the last three weeks, and which have destroyed hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of timber have reached more alarming proportions. On the ranges in Chouteau County, which heretofore escaped, and on which cattlemen were depending to keep their stock this winter, thousands of heads of cattle were seen burning. Couriers report the utmost consternation prevailing at Georgetown, and that a large force of men organized to go to the rescue. In Yellowstone Co. the fire covers an area of eight miles, and is spreading rapidly. Ranges in that section have also been almost entirely destroyed. The entire territory is covered with dense clouds of smoke which the sun cannot penetrate. Unless a heavy rain comes there is no hope that the fires will be arrested until they have burned themselves out.

A Disastrous Fire.

NEW YORK, Aug. 19.

Early this morning a fire broke out in the kitchen of a restaurant on the ground floor of a five story tenement at 307 Seventh Avenue. Nine of the sixty odd occupants of the house were burned to death, and it is a great wonder that many more did not lose their lives. The fire originated in the rear of John Snyder's restaurant at an hour when all the people in the house were sleeping soundly. Just how it started is as yet a mystery, but as the cook is missing it is presumed an accident occurred when he was making a fire in the big range. The awful speed with which the flames swept through the building suggests the use of kerosene by the cook.

The Black Diamond Seizure.

OTTAWA, Aug. 19.

Hon. Mr. Bowell on Friday received the official report concerning the seizure of the Black Diamond, and it was considered at a Cabinet meeting on Saturday. Copies will be forwarded to the Imperial authorities for the communication of the result and of the claims in due course through the regular diplomatic channels to the United States Government.

'Tis Count Edison Now.

PARIS, Aug. 19.

A special envoy of King Humbert of Italy to-day presented Thomas A. Edison, the famous American electrician, with the insignia of the Grand Officer of the Crown of Italy. Edison thus becomes Count and his wife Countess.

OTTAWA, Aug. 19.

John Irwin, a young man employed by the Singer Sewing Machine Company was arrested here to-day, charged with forgery and embezzlement.

LONDON, Ont., Aug. 19.

DIED.

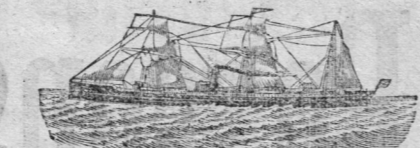
At Point Prim, July 29, Annie, dearly loved daughter of Alexander and Margaret McLeod, aged five months.
