E. Island have become justly famed.

**NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.**

MINNEAPOLIS, MINN., July 1.

This morning on Minnetonka Lake, the pleasure steamer "Mary White," lying at the wharf of the St. Louis Hotel, exploded her boiler, wrecking the boat, which sunk immediately. The following is a list of killed and wounded:—

William Chadwick, engineer, instantly killed.

J. R. Plattenburg, guest at the Hotel, fatally wounded, and died in two hours.

G. A. Gaines, head waiter of the Hotel, killed.

John Stewart, pilot, fatally injured, and now dying.

Edwin S. Perkins, a fireman, scalded about the face and neck.

Frank Adams, head clerk of the Hotel, scalded and hurt in the eye.

A. S. Domond, of Minneapolis, shocked and prostrated.

Jim, a colored porter at the Hotel, scalded and burned.

Lang, a porter, scalded and burned.

Harry, a colored boy, badly hurt, arm dislocated, and body scalded.

English George, scalded and bruised.

The boat was on her way to Wayzald to take on board 100 excursionists, and had stopped at St. Louis Hotel en route. Her boiler was known as Ames' boiler, and it is the third of that make which has exploded on the same lake in the last three years, each time with fatal results.

NEW LONDON, CT., July 1.

The only sad occurrence of regatta day was a painful accident on the Northern Railroad and which resulted in the deaths of President W. D. Lincoln of the Boston and Albany Railroad, and Mrs. Dr. Appleton of Boston. Mr. Lincoln and Mrs. Appleton were seated on the rear platform of the private car of Mr. Lincoln, attached to the moving grand stand, watching the race. The car was next to the forward engine of the train. Soon after the train started the coupling pin connecting the private car with the platform car in rear broke in twain and the forward engine, released of the heavy weight it was dragging, shot rapidly ahead. The shock threw Mr. Lincoln and Mrs. Appleton upon the rails, the forward wheels of the platform car passing over the lady and gentleman, crushing them terribly. The rear wheels came to a standstill. Mrs. Appleton died within fifteen or twenty minutes after the accident, while Mr. Lincoln lived nearly an hour.

LONDON, July 1.

Sterling Exchange 4.84½ for long; 4.86½ for short.

Gladstone, replying to Phillip Callan, said that in view of what was happening in some parts of Ireland, he did not consider the present a fitting time to allow Condon, Clark, Luby, O'Donovan Rossa, and other Fenian prisoners, to return from exile. Callan, in his question, pointed out the amnesty granted to Communists in France and to the treatment of Secessionists in the United States.

Two hundred and twelve deaths here on Tuesday; seventeen by heat.

Herman Lessberger, iron dealer, who recently failed, filed his schedule, showing liabilities \$2,181,672; nominal assets \$2,290,309; real assets \$5,692.

A case of Asiatic cholera is reported at Kensington, New York.

The total fatalities by the "Seawanhak" disaster numbered 29, with 49 injured and 19 still missing.

PITTSBURG, July 1.

Ten counterfeiters were arrested by U. S. Officials here yesterday, together with their materials and a large quantity of bogus coin.

NEW YORK, July 1.

There were 24 prostrations and 15 deaths in this city on Wednesday.

LONDON, July 1.

The bullion in the Bank of England decreased £63,000 during the week. The proportion of reserve liability was last week 521½, and is now 443½.

PARIS, June 34.

Evening journals announce that the directors of all religious houses have made preparations in expectation of the action of the authorities to-day. All doors of religious houses will be closed, and the police will be obliged to effect forcible entrance and break open each individual cell. The Jesuits' House only will be dealt with to-day. Thirty-five magistrates have resigned sooner than execute the religious decrees.

It is believed that the inferior brethren of the chief Jesuit establishment have left the city, while the rest are prepared to abandon it without resistance.

The last of the series of meetings in the Cirque D'Hives, to protest against anti-Jesuit decrees, was held last night. A crowd assembled outside the building. Blows were exchanged between the mob outside and those issuing from the Hall. The mob hooted a number of priests.

PARIS, July 1.

The closing of the Jesuit Chapel in the Rue Severs with the sacrament left inside, is regarded as a great desecration by the Catholics. The persons arrested in the street, including an exprefect, a writer on the "Journal la Justice," and some students, were all released after examination.

M. Constans, Minister of Interior and Worship, received a letter threatening him assassination in the name of the Sacred Heart.

LONDON, July 1.

A semi-official journal states that the Government's action against the Jesuits has not led to disturbance in any part of France, and concludes as follows: "The Government knows its duty and will perform it with firmness."

A Paris despatch says the number of persons expelled from a Jesuit chapel here yesterday morning was 13, including one Englishman and one Russian.
