## TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

### CANADIAN.

**OTTAWA, May 25.**  
The Department of Agriculture has been advised of the arrival of Messrs. Hans Christensen and Lars Commassin, delegates from Scandinavia, who intend selecting land in Manitoba for a large body of immigrants who are expected to arrive during the summer.

**MONTREAL, May 25.**  
Miss Fanny Parnell, at the invitation of the Ladies Land League, will lecture here shortly.

Some parties having inserted the objectionable words in the Hacket monument yesterday, the Mount Royal Cemetery trustees offer a reward of one hundred dollars for their apprehension.

**SARNIA, Ont., May 25.**  
As Mr. D. Mackenzie's daughter, of this place, was rowing on the Bay, last night, together with some companions, the boat upset. Miss Mackenzie was drowned. All the rest were saved.

### EUROPE AND THE EAST.

**PARIS, May 25.**  
The "Citoyen" is to be prosecuted for publishing the report of a private meeting, organized by the irconciliables, to protest against the sentence on Hessay Helfmann, and which, in a resolution, blamed France for crushing the right of asylum.

The Senate has been specially convened to-day to ratify the Tunis treaty.

The cargo of the English schooner searched by the French officers was afterwards discharged in the presence of the British authorities. No gunpowder or arms were found.

**VIENNA, May 25.**

The Bulgarian Government has arrested ex Minister Karaveloff, and also proclaimed martial law in Ruzhsek Widdin and Tirnova.

**GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.**

**LONDON, May 25.**

The tide of emigration from the South of Ireland is steadily decreasing. There was a decrease of 45 per cent. in April, as compared with the same month last year.

The returns of the present month to date show a decrease of 25 per cent.

The Times says the Irish members of Parliament intend to ask the Government to grant another morning sitting to finish the debate on the Irish arrests.

Dillon writes denying he had requested to be removed from the infirmary to his former quarters in Kilmainham Jail, because of other prisoners being there with him.

The British ship "Eunice," Nicholas, from Bristol for Quebec, was abandoned on 10th inst., sinking. Crew saved.

In the Commons, last evening, Mr. Fawcett, Postmaster General, said both the treasury and post office are now considering proposals submitted to them in regard to the position of telegraph operators. He expressed his willingness to do what he could in their behalf. The telegraph operators in the employ of the English postal service have petitioned for an increase of wages.

Parnell is seriously unwell and has been ordered two days rest by his physicians. Brennan has been visited in Naas jail. He expressed himself pleased with his treatment generally, but complained bitterly on being obliged to retire to his cell at six o'clock in the evening and to remain until seven in the morning.

**UNITED STATES.**

**FOND DU LAC, May 25.**

There is great excitement here over the failure of R. A. Baker's Bank. The loss will be over \$300,000. Baker, the owner, and Burroughs, the cashier, were both arrested. People pulled revolvers on Burroughs and tried to shoot him. The city will lose \$40,000, ruining the city treasurer, J. Perrion. Everything indicates general crookedness on the part of Baker and Burroughs.

**WASHINGTON, May 25.**

The Secretary of the Navy has ordered Admiral Wyman, commanding the North Atlantic fleet, to immediately send one of the vessels of his squadron to Merida, Mexico, where the American bark Acazia, of Boston, is reported unjustly seized by the Mexican authorities.

The steamer Yantic will be sent to Merida, Mexico, to co-operate with the U. S. Consul there in regard to the seizure by Mexican authorities of the American bark Acazia.

**NEW YORK, May 25.**

Despatches from Albany indicate that neither side will give way in the pending contest for Senators, and in all probability there will be a "deadlock."

The Evening Post has passed under the control of Carl Schurz, Horace White and E. L. Godkin. Tomorrow Schurz assumes the editorial charge.

**ALBANY, May 26.**

There is no change in the political situation. Voting for the Senators commences on Tuesday next. Prominent Republicans urge that every effort be made to prevent disintegration of the party. Several telegrams from New York urge the re-election of Conkling and Platt. The Democrats have their own party work to do and will not unite with either section of the Republicans.

The resignation of Mr. George Stephens, President of the Bank of Montreal, has been placed in the hands of the Board of Directors.

### Personal

Archibald Forbes sailed from New York this week.

Bismarck is said to be engaged in preparing a solution of the Eastern question.

The consecration of the Bishop-Coadjutor for the Diocese of Fredericton will take place on July 10th.

The census returns of Jersey give the population as being 51,020, showing a decrease of 5,600 since 1871.

A despatch from Victoria, B. C., says the first locomotives on the Canadian Pacific railway are running between Emory and Yale.

"Fruit eaten at night is baneful." This is one of those wise axioms proved to be true by Adam. His trouble was caused by eating an apple after Eve.

Stirring news may shortly be expected from Afghanistan, as active preparations for war are being made by Ayoub Khan and Abdurrahman.

Mr. Fawcett, the blind Postmaster-General of England, has decided to give employment to a number of deaf and dumb persons in the department devoted to the sorting of newspapers.

St. Petersburg is in a ferment over a report that Hessay Helfmann, the condemned female Nihilist, was tortured to death by repeated hangings a few days after the birth of her child, in order to extract a confession from her.

Owing to his absorbing duties as president of the Pacific Railway Company, and his frequent absence from the city, Mr. George Stephen has tendered his resignation of the presidency of the Bank of Montreal.

Mr. Brennan, Secretary of the Land League, was arrested on the 23rd inst., under the provisions of the Coercion Act, and conveyed to the prison at Naas, County Kildare. The warrant for his arrest charges him with inciting to acts of violence.

It is said that the Empress Eugenie has bought an estate fourteen miles from Chislehurst, with the intention of building a church on it, in which the remains of the Emperor Napoleon III. and the Prince Imperial will be buried.

In Alexandria, Piedmont, a newspaper man and an army officer lately fought a duel, in which shots were exchanged with impunity. The pistols had been loaded by the seconds with chocolate caramels, and this fact leaking out caused the public to explode with laughter.

President Garfield is freely recognizing the claims of the colored people to office. Besides giving Fred Douglas a \$10,000 office as Registrar of the District of Columbia, he has appointed Ex-Senator Bruce of Mississippi, to the Registrarship of the Treasury, with a handsome salary.

Master Coningsby Dirasoli is said to resemble greatly his uncle, bey as he is, for avoiding the betrayal of emotion. He sat in the House of Lords the other day listening to the eulogies on the late ex-Premier, and while he listened carefully his face remained thoroughly impassive.

Admiral Sir Leopold McClintock and his officers will entertain the Governor General and Princess Louise at a grand ball on the Flagship Northampton on their arrival at Halifax to open the Dominion Art Exhibition on the 1st of July. There will also be a grand review of troops, and a brilliant time generally.

The anti-Jewish disturbances at Odessa continue with unabated violence. Forty-five restaurants in that town have been wrecked and plundered. And yet the troops are bivouacked in the streets! In connection with these persecutions a deputation of influential Jewish citizens was to have had an audience of the Czar.

Garibaldi has written another letter on the Tunis question, declaring that the French Republic has lost his good opinion—which will doubtless be sad news to the French people—and pointing out that France's action may compel the nations to round her that Nice and Corsica are as much French as the writer is a Tartar. In one sense the latter proposition is unfortunately worded.

The Halifax Chronicle, we are rather surprised to see, speaks, upon the whole, favorably of the appointment of Hon. James Macdonald to the Chief Justiceship of Nova Scotia. True, it regards Mr. Macdonald as having less scholarly refinement than Sir Wm. Young, and does not think him to be an unusually profound lawyer. But it admits his claims to the position, acknowledges his general qualifications therefor, and concludes that he will make a good Chief Justice, and win for himself in the new position general popularity and respect. As things go in party circles, that is fairly well for the Chronicle.—News.
