Meeting of Presbytery.

The Presbytery of P. E. Island met on
3rd inst., in Zion Church, Charlottetown.
Present: Revs. J. M. Macleod, Neil Mc-
Kay, Wm. R. Frame, Wm. Grant, J. G.
Cameron, Wm. P. Archibald, George Mc-
Millan, E. Gillies, A. B. McLeod, A. W.
Mahon, W. H. Spencer, and Geo. Fisher,
Ministers, and Mr. James Ramsay, ruling
elder.

In compliance with a requisition from
a number of families in Mimitingash, Rev.
Messrs. Carr, McKay, A. B. McLeod, and
George Fisher, with the Presbytery elders,
were appointed a committee to organize
them into a preaching station, and to aid
them in providing a suitable place of
worship. Rev. Mr. Carr, with Hon. Benj.
Rogers, David Gordon, and William
Thompson, were requested to act as an
interim session. The following supply of
preaching was appointed for this new con-
gregation, viz: Rev. Mr. Carr, on 15th
inst., at 10.30; Rev. A. B. McLeod, 1st
March, same hour; Rev. Mr. Fisher, 15th
March; and Rev. Mr. Carr, 29th March, at
6.30 p. m.

The Trustees of the Prince Street Pres-
byterian Church property were authorized
to sell the Church, Manse, grounds, &c.,
and to take steps to procure the necessary
legislation to enable them to dispose of the
property.

The Session Records of Alberton,
Georgetown, and Montague, were examined,
found correct, and attested by the moder-
ator of Presbytery.

Rev. Wm. R. Frame, on account of con-
tinued throat trouble, tendered his resig-
nation of the pastoral charge of Mount Ste-
wart and West St. Peter's. Rev. Mr. Spencer
was appointed to preach in said congre-
gation on 15th inst., intimate their pastor's
resignation and cite them to appear for their
interests at a meeting of Presbytery to be
held in Charlottetown, on 17th March, in
Zion Church, at 11 o'clock.

The following supply of preaching was
appointed, viz:—For Valleyfield, Rev. A.
S. Stewart, 15th inst.; Rev. E. Gillies, 1st
March; and Rev. Mr. Grant on the 15th
March. East St. Peter's, Rev. A. W.
Mahon, 15th inst.; South Side at 10.30,
and North Side at 2.30 p. m.; Rev. J. G.
Cameron, South Side at 10.30 on 22nd inst.
and Rev. W. H. Spencer on 15th March,
Mount Stewart and West St. Peter's, Rev.
Wm. H. Spencer, 15th inst.; Rev. James
Allan, 22nd inst., and Rev. J. G. Cameron
8th March. Richmond Bay West, Rev.
Geo. McMillan, 22nd inst.; Lot 11, at 10.30;
Tyne Valley, at 2.30; Lot 14, at 6.30.
Rev. Mr. Mason, 1st March, at Lot 14, at
10.30; Tyne Valley, at 2.30, and Egmont
Bay at 6.30. Rev. Wm. P. Archibald on
15th March at Lot 11, Tyne Valley and Lot
14, and Tyne Valley and Egmont Bay.

Rev. W. H. Spencer was appointed in-
terim moderator of the session of East
St. Peter's, instead of Rev. J. G. Cameron,
resigned.

The following congregations were reported
as having raised or guaranteed the sums
requested, in aid of the Augmentation
scheme, viz:—Bedouque, Summerside,
Princetown, Zion Church, Bay Fortune, W.
and C. Rivers and Brookfield, Alberton,
Cavendish, Tryon and Bonshaw, New Lon-
don North, West Cape, St. Peters and
Brackley Point Roads, Tignish, Richmond
Bay East and Richmond Bay West.
