

AGAINST HAYDEN

Howard Defends Crown Tonight

HALIFAX (CP)—Richard Kid Howard of Halifax, Canadian light-weight boxing champion, has been sweating off excess poundage for 10 days to prepare for his title defence against Jackie Hayden of Westville, N.S., here tonight.

The champion 12 round bout will be Howard's first defence of the title since he lifted it from Armand Savoie of Montreal in September, 1954.

Despite a struggle to pare his weight to the 135-pound limit, Howard remains the favorite of bettors at 5-3, odds likely to level off by fight time after a large contingent of Hayden's followers arrive in town.

BUSY IN U.S.

Howard gained a unanimous decision over Hayden in a 10-round non-title fight here last month. Hayden's showing against Howard in that fight led the Canadian Boxing Federation to sanction a title go.

Since winning the title Howard has kept busy meeting some of the best lightweights in the United States.

Geo. Chuvalo Gets Nod Over Artaur

TORONTO (CP)—George Chuvalo of Toronto, young sensation of the 1956 Jack Dempsey tournament, Monday night gained a unanimous eight-round decision over South Africa's Johnny Arthur in the main event of a professional boxing show.

Arthur, a native of Johannesburg and heavyweight champion of South Africa, was the first pro opponent of Chuvalo since he disposed of four fighters in a total of 12 minutes at the Dempsey elimination tournament here two months ago.

The 18-year-old Chuvalo scored well with rights to the head but couldn't get to Arthur with a knock-out.

There was no knockdown. Arthur slipped to his right knee in the third round but got up quickly.

Hogan Says Golf Course Is Easy But He Is Pessimistic

ROCHESTER, N.Y. (AP)—Stoical Ben Hogan confounded listeners Monday by calling Oak Hill "one of the easiest open courses I've ever played" and in the next breath adding:

"I'm playing pretty rotten. Unless I improve, my chances don't look very good."

Early arrivals for the 56th annual National Open golf championship, beginning Thursday, immediately acceded the Texas master of launching a campaign of "confusion warfare."

"That's Ben," dourly said one of his longtime rivals. "He's talking about how easy the course is so they'll toughen it. He knows he has a better chance on a tougher course."

Hogan, looking a mile thinner and more tired than when he was beaten by Jack Fleck at San Francisco last year in his bid for an unprecedented fifth Open championship, predicted the tournament would be won by one of the lowest scorers.

Other contenders joined Hogan in saying the beautiful, tree-lined Oak Hill course is far from the nightmare dreamed up by the U. S. Golf Association, in tournaments past. They called it "a fair course, but not an easy one."

D'Amato To Go Ahead With Fight Plans Despite Break

NEW YORK (AP)—Floyd Patterson's manager said Monday he was going ahead with plans for heavy-weight title fight with Archie Moore in September despite Patterson's broken right hand.

"I'm operating on the theory we'll fight in September until I get medical authority to the contrary," said manager Gus D'Amato. "The doctors told me Floyd had youth and good health on his side and those factors may bring about a more rapid healing."

Moore's manager, Charlie Johnston, ruled out any idea of Moore boxing Hurricane Jackson in case Patterson wasn't ready. "We're not interested," said Johnston.

BOSTON (AP)—Tom Brewer held Cleveland to three hits for his ninth victory of the season Monday night as Boston Red Sox defeated the Indians 5-1 for a split in a day-night double-header. The Indians, limited to four hits, won the afternoon game 4-1 on home runs by Al Smith, Chico Carrasquel and Al Rosen.

The 23-year-old Brewer gave up a run on a walk and singles by Roy C. Cavolito and Jim Busby in the second but then settled down to become the first American League hurler to win nine games. He has lost only one.

Yis Wertz' double off Ted Williams' glove in left centre in the fourth was the only other Cleveland hit off the Boston ace who has allowed just 23 earned runs in 86 2/3 innings.

Brewer, Williams and Jackie Jensen led a 10-hit Boston assault on loser Mike Garcia and reliever Bob Teller.

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Brooklyn Dodgers, taking advantage of three unearned runs, Monday night downed St. Louis Cardinals 8-6 to keep the Cardinals from moving into first place in the National League.

Duke Snider homered twice for the world champions and Don Newcombe gained his ninth victory.

As a result of successive St. Louis miscues by Don Basagame and Grady Hatton in the eighth, Brooklyn needed only two hits to score four times and drop the Redbirds into third place behind idle Pittsburgh.

BALTIMORE (AP)—Bob Nieman and Gus Triandos knocked in all the runs for Baltimore Monday.

Harris Posts Sixth Win

MONTREAL (CP)—Montreal Royals erupted for nine runs in a wild third inning Monday night, then coasted to a 13-8 International League win over Richmond Virgians.

The league leaders sent 14 men to the plate in that stanza to shell Richmond starter Jim Coates for seven runs on six hits. Dick Starr gave up two more tallies before the Royals were satisfied.

Coates absorbed his seventh loss in nine decisions. Besides Starr, Steve Kraly and Alva Cicotte also appeared on the Richmond mound.
