Billy Wright Approaches Unique Mark In Soccer

Next April, the 34-year-old Wolverhampton Wanderers centre half and captain hopes to make his 100th appearance for England, when he plays against Scotland at Wembley.

The blonde defender from Ironbridge, Shropshire, has long since outdistanced the soccer heroes of previous decades in his accumulation of international caps. His consistency has made him an automatic choice ever since 1946.

Bob Crompton, with 42 appearances for Scotland, was the previous international record-holder. STEADY PERFORMER

Since his England debut, Wright has missed only three matches, all because of injuries.

Short and stocky, Wright came to Wolverhampton in 1939 looking for a job in soccer. He was taken on as a groundsboy but after five months manager Frank Buckley told him he was too small to make the grade.

A broken-hearted Wright left the manager's office, resigned to a career outside soccer. But not for long. Members of the staff interceded on his behalf and just before the Second World War started, Buckley relented and signed him to a playing contract.

Buckley had made one of the best soccer investments of all time for a mere £10. When the war ended there was no holding Wright, who went on to win every honor soccer can offer.

CLEAN PLAYER He has been described as "one of the world's greatest, most respected and best-liked footballers." Rarely is a penalty or free kick awarded against him and few can recall an occasion when he has earned a referee's rebuke.

The present Wolves manager, Stan Cullis, who was a star player for the club when Wright came to Wolverhampton, says Wright is still as enthusiastic as

when he was a ground-staff lad. "I noticed him then," Cullis recalls, "because he was so tremendously keen on every job—even if it was only cleaning boots."

England's team manager, Walter Winterbottom, says Wright never has a bad game. "He has his own standard of behavior which is a remarkable example to the England team—always cheerful, always punctual, always smiling."
