As a result of general buying activity in Europe, British United States and Canada, there has been a tendency on the part of sellers to advance prices. Buyers, on the other hand although apparently willing to deal on the old level of values have been slow to meet the new prices asked and sales have been slow, except on offerings which have remained at former quotations. The evident shortage of this year's cotton crop and the already appreciable advance in prices for British tops and yarns is creating a stronger undertone to wool prices and it would appear only a matter of time until buyers will have to meet the prices asked by sellers.

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—Babe Ruth has played in two world's series with the Red Sox against the Dodgers of 1916, and the Cubs of two years later but though he has 142 home runs to his credit in the last three seasons Babe never yet has made any world's series home runs.

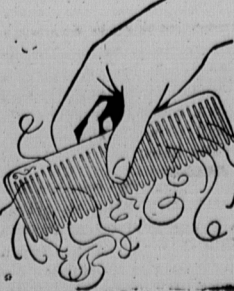
Babe Ruth, outfielder, may be through as a major league pitcher but he still holds the record for consecutive scoreless world's series innings established when he was pitching for the Red Sox.

The feeble Athletics slammed Ruth for six runs in the eighth inning of Saturday's second game, just after the Yanks had won the pennant.

But Ruth can point to 29 consecutive scoreless world's series innings which is one more than even the great Christie Mathewson may claim. After being scored on in the first inning of the second Red Sox-Brooklyn game in 1916 Ruth shut the Dodgers out for 13 innings winning a 14 inning game 2 to 1. Babe next pitched world's series ball against 1918 Cubs, shutting them out in 9 innings. His next "out" against the same club in the same series he went along for seven innings without being scored on and won both games.

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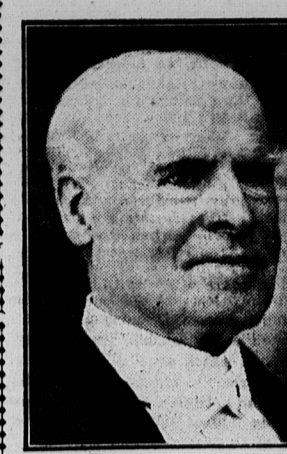

The Branch Managers have complete and intimate knowledge of each local situation and are in close touch with crop conditions in all sections of the districts shown. The map overlaid indicates the approximate extent of the districts mentioned.

PRairie PROVINCES—SUMMARY

—Although drought, and worms, saw fly, and hail, here caused injury and loss, a large crop, estimated at 271,000,000 bushels of wheat and 331,000,000 bushels of oats, has been cut. Continuous rain since cutting in Saskatchewan and Manitoba may reduce this and certainly lower the grade. Harvesting is just commencing.

CALARY DISTRICT

weather continues favourable and many farmers have finished threshing. Results east and south disappointing, but Red Deer average yield of wheat is 25, oats 40, barley 35 bushels. LETHBRIDGE DISTRICT: threshing completed in some districts, but her expect to finish middle October. Yield very disappointing. REGINA DISTRICT: threshing delayed by rain since 8th inst., is now 20 per cent completed. Rains have lowered grade. SASKATOON DISTRICT: threshing should be general now. After 3 weeks delay many districts just commencing. Up to 1st week September about 23 per cent of wheat shipments graded between No. 1 hard and No. 2 northern.

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC

Final reports indicate that cereal and hay crops are below average. The Lower St. Lawrence and the Lake St. John regions had the best returns, while the Eastern Townships suffered severely from drought. A good potato crop is expected in the Lower St. Lawrence region, but in other parts of the Province the yield will be small and in some districts almost a failure. Other roots will be below average. Grass pastures have improved considerably recently. It is estimated that crops in general will be from 60 per cent to 70 per cent of an average year.

PROVINCE OF ONTARIO

While this year have not turned out as heavy as usual, general returns have been fair. All grains were below average and of poor quality. Hay a short crop but offset by an exceptionally good silage corn. Early small fruits light but of good quality. Apples below average. Root crops promise well with exception of potatoes, tobacco, a large acreage of best quality.

PROVINCE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

Hay and fodder, a record crop of good quality. Hay yield 25 per cent greater than the 1920 tonnage of 254,000. Threshing about completed. Average grain crop. Fruit results generally satisfactory. Okanagan apple output estimated 2,900,000 boxes which is double the yield of 1920, and 25 per cent over the record of 1919. Pears 75 per cent increase over last year. Stone fruits will yield under 1920, but small fruit tonnage considerably in excess of previous years. Potato crop below normal.

ORGANIZER COMING FOR POPPY DAY



Madame Blancheron, of Paris Consults With G. W. V. A. Secretary.

S. JOHN, Oct. 4.—Madame Blancheron, of Paris, France, organizer for Canada of the French Association responsible for the Poppy Day movement, spent Saturday and yesterday in the city consulting with A. I. Macdon, local secretary of the G. W. V. A. in regard to the Poppy Day campaign which will be held on Armistice Day.

Poppy Day originated in France by a French Association engaged in doing war relief work amongst the women and children of the devastated areas there. Seizing on the idea of commemorating the gallant dead who "sleep in Flanders Fields where poppies grow" by the wearing of the scarlet poppies immortalized by Col. MacDermott, the Canadian poet soldier, the association set women and children of the war scarred districts to work making artificial poppies, these were sold to the general public, and the proceeds were devoted to relief work in the war areas.

The idea was introduced into United States last year by the originator of the idea, Madame Guerin, and met with a wonderful response from the American public, who brought over three million of the poppies.

This year Madame Blancheron has been assigned to the task of introducing the movement to the Canadian people. Here the G. W. V. A. have been asked to co-operate in the work, and the proceeds are to be divided amongst the two associations, the French and the Canadian. In both cases the monies will be devoted to the benevolent work in which they are respectively interested.

Madame Blancheron will then proceed from here to Nova Scotia thence to Prince Edward Island to confer with the secretaries of the provincial committees there, she will then go to Winnipeg. She has already met with much success and a warm welcome in Quebec where Sir Arthur Currie is the president
