Rev. J. C. Robson then delivered his second theme address, using as his text Ephesians 4: 15.

On Monday morning, the president, Doris Ferguson, conducted the Council meeting. The minutes of last year's Conference and of the executive meeting held in May were read and approved. The treasurer gave the report of executive funds and the contributions made to the mission project and the camp fund.

Yugoslavia, With U.N. Aid, to Help Disabled



Faced with the fact that 500,000 of her men, women and children were disabled, and she had neither the facilities nor trained experts to do the job, Yugoslavia presented her problem to United Nations, who in turn sought aid of Dr. Henry H. Kessler, one of its consultants, on rehabilitation of the physically handicapped to Yugoslavia. Upon his return last winter from Yugoslavia, where he spent six weeks visiting hospitals, clinics, sanatoriums, he recommended the U. N. provide fellowships to a team of eight Yugoslav specialists for study of the latest rehabilitation methods in the U. S. and England. Following their return home this team will open and operate the country's first centre, which it is hoped will make useful citizens once more of handicapped like this little boy seen above receiving therapy treatment.

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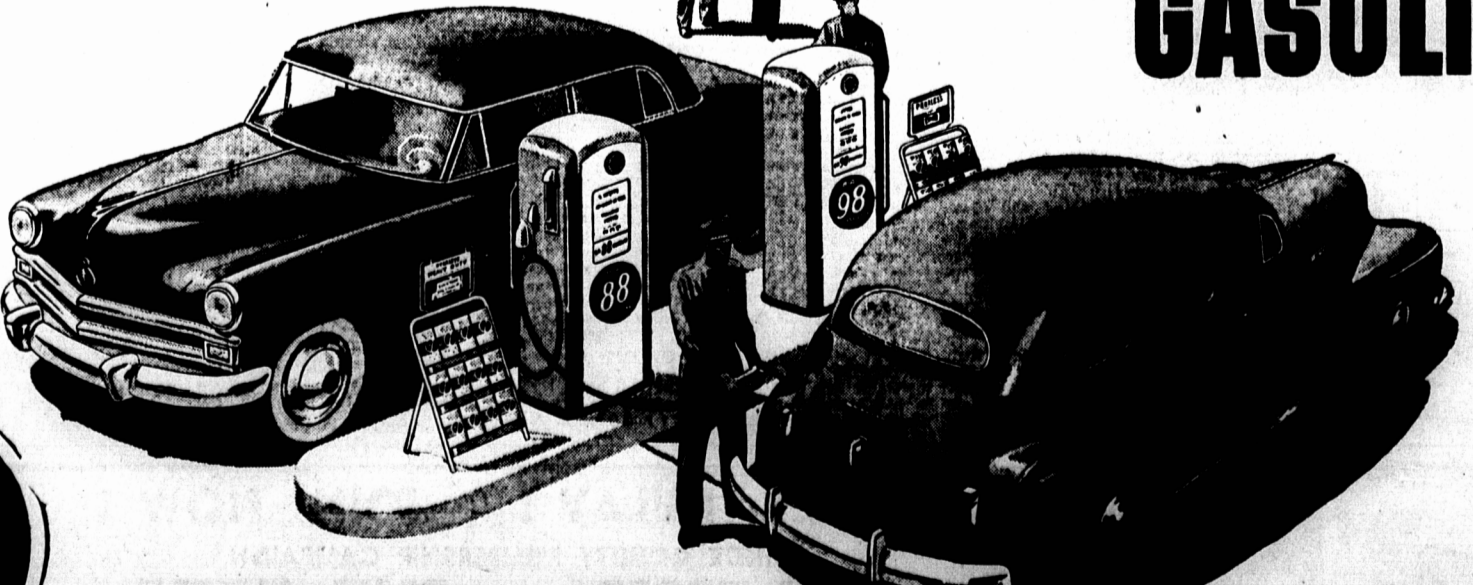
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
