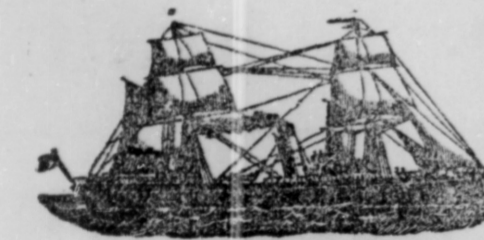

The Methodist Church.

TORONTO, Sept 2.—At a meeting here of the special committee of the Methodist general conference it was agreed that 24 delegates should be sent from the Canadian Methodist church to the Ecumenical Conference to be held in London, England, in 1901—four delegates from Toronto, three each from London, Hamilton, Bay of Quinte, and Montreal; two each from Manitoba, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick and one each from British Columbia and Newfoundland.
