THE DAILY EXAMINER OCTOBER 16, 1899. **CALL TO ARMS.** **LIUT.-COL. MOORE,** District Officer Commanding, received, yesterday afternoon, an advance copy of a Militia Order, dated at Ottawa on the 14th inst. The despatch states, as has already been announced by THE EXAMINER, that 1000 Canadians are to be sent from Canada to the Transvaal. The places of enlistment will be Victoria, Vancouver, Winnipeg, London, Toronto, Ottawa, Kingston, Montreal, Quebec, St. John, N. B., Charlottetown and Halifax. Men who are desirous of enlisting should make application to the District Officer Commanding or to a commanding officer of a company. The ages of applicants must range from 22 to 40 and the height be at least 5ft 6 inches, while the chest measurement must be 34 inches. As there are twelve points at which enrolment may be made, it is thought that the number required from this province will not exceed fifty.

A QUESTION. A few days ago, THE EXAMINER, arguing from the fact that Premier Farquharson was actively interfering in the Asylum investigation, ventured the opinion that he might be expected to try to "fix" the report of the Commission. On Friday, after the evidence was all in, Mr. Farquharson addressed the commissioners and said: "He would like to have the Commission express their opinion of the duty of the press, and for them to express their disapproval of its action. The statements have been greatly exaggerated and calculated to do the province harm." If this action of the Premier were not an attempt to "fix" the report of the commission in so far as the press is concerned, we should like to know what it means. Mr. Farquharson, who appointed the commissioners—a majority of whom are his party followers—and who has all along been doing his best to "boss" the commissioners, has publicly asked them to express disapproval of the action of the press. The question is, if Mr. Farquharson would do this in public what would he not do in private? We had little thought that THE EXAMINER's inference from the Premier's actions before the commission would have, so soon, been borne out and proved.

NO QUESTIONS ASKED. The influence of Premier Farquharson and his assistants—Mr. Arthur Peters, Q. C., and others—was exhibited in the fact that, although it was proved "up to the hilt," that bad food was, at times, supplied at the asylum, no questions were asked as to who supplied it. There was a great pothor about the name of the writer of the letter signed "A Witness,"—a point of no importance—but no question was raised concerning those who foisted upon the institution the "black" and "strong" beef, the "dirty" milk and oatmeal, the "bad" flour and molasses. Information upon these points, however interesting, might have discomfited Premier Farquharson and his friends. No questions were asked.

—The importance of keeping out of European complications is urged in some quarters as an excuse for the Government's non-action in the Transvaal crisis. The Montreal Gazette: "What European powers can we be complicated with through our doing as other British colonies have done? And if there should be complications what of it? Are Canadians so afraid of a German frown that they will not do their duty?"

THE ASYLUM MATTER. THAT the statements published in THE EXAMINER have not been "grossly exaggerated" as stated by Premier Farquharson we have demonstrated by short quotations from the evidence. It was remarked by a gentleman, in the street, on Saturday, that "the charges have been proved up to the hilt." That is, substantially, the fact. We have no disposition to dwell upon the fact of the disgusting food at times supplied to the patients and attendants. This was evidently the result primarily of carelessness and inattention to duty on the part of the trustees, resulting in slackness on the part of the officials and in increasing boldness on the part of contractors anxious to get rid of unsaleable goods. It may be remedied by a return to carelessness; and this we are glad to be assured has been the result of the revelations of THE EXAMINER's correspondent. Reminded of their duty under the law and as men responsible to the public, the trustees will probably be more careful in future, and a corresponding impulse will be felt among the officials. That which we desire to impress, now, is the necessity for instant action in regard to the heating of the building, and the improvement of the condition of the sick and delicate and curable among the patients. As to these points the evidence reflects disgrace upon the Province and its government. Certainly the doctor is not to be blamed for not affecting cures under existing conditions. Certainly the other officials are not to be blamed for the suffering of the patients, in heat and in cold, without hospital accommodation, without special attention, occupying the same apartments as the strong and the robust in our unique madhouse. The blame devolves wholly upon the Trustees and the Government, which has, in spite of the oft-repeated representations of the Grand Jury and the Press, neglected to provide the additional room which is the pre-requisite of improvement in this regard. While they wrangled with Mr. Walter Lowe about a few hundreds of dollars, the expenditure of which was necessitated by their architect's blunder, "the most helpless of God's creatures" have suffered discomfort in the Prince Edward Hospital for the Insane such as imagination fails to picture or pen describe. We call for an immediate reform in this regard.

NOTES AND COMMENTS —Freights by ocean steamships plying between Canada and Great Britain have advanced 25 to 32 per cent as a result of the South African war. —The Parliament of Victoria, Australia, has voted £30,000 (\$150,000) as a war credit for the purpose of sending the Victoria contingent to the Transvaal. —To Sergeant Arthur R. Dillon, of this city, belongs the honour of being the first man in this province to sign the roll of volunteers for service in South Africa. —It is reported that three representatives of the Transvaal are in the United States for the purpose of interviewing President McKinley. It is probable that they will be refused an audience.
