

Wilson Caims Futlity In Tory Nuclear Policy

LONDON (CP)—Harold Wilson, Labor party leader, said Monday the Soviet Union's new space-satellite test shows the futility of the British Tory nuclear policy.

Campaigning for Thursday's general election, Wilson said the Russian exploit to attack once again Prime Minister Sir Alec Douglas-Home's contention that Britain must retain its separate nuclear deterrent.

"It's the shape of the arms race of the future," Wilson said of the satellite carrying three Russians into space. "Does Sir Alec think he is going into that race?"

The Labor chief added that four years ago he predicted the development of satellites capable of delivering nuclear weapons.

Sir Alec meanwhile led a Conservative counter-attack against the gains Labor is reported to be making late in the campaign.

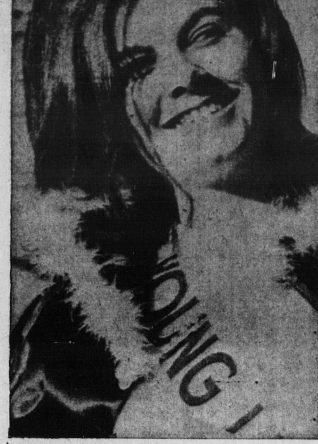
