### Preliminary Hearing Opens In Georgetown

GEORGETOWN — The preliminary hearing of Joseph Gladstone Viozco, Valleyfield, opened before Magistrate James B. Johnston, in Kings County magistrate's court here Wednesday. He is charged with indecently assaulting a female. Dr. G.S.A. Inman and Cpl. Douglas Hender, RCMP, testified for the Crown and the hearing was adjourned to Jan. 30. John P. Nicholson appeared for the accused and all cases before the court here prosecuted by Deputy Attorney General J.A. McGuigan. John Charles Martell, Georgetown, charged with possession of two paint brushes of a total value not exceeding \$50 had his case adjourned to Jan. 16 to obtain counsel. Adjoined to Jan. 30 was a charge of impaired driving against Edward Clow, Montague. Represented by Mr. Nicholson, the evidence of one defence witness remains to be heard in this case. Ray Lebert Machon, Montague, was fined \$25 and costs for failing to file income tax returns. Mrs. Mabel Elizabeth Henderson, Greek River, represented by Mr. Nicholson, pleaded guilty to having liquor in her possession which had not been conducted by Albre Arsenault, Summerside. Limited and Steel Limited. Liquid Air's giant oxygens will be producing more than 700 tons of oxygen daily by midsummer. Liquid Air's bulk plant at Piquette produces 350 tons of oxygen daily.
