


—South African war to night.

—The schr Sainte Marie has completed loading and sails this evening for Bermuda with the following cargo shipped by A Horne & Co for Mr H C Outerbridge: 24 horses, 4 cattle, 26 live hogs, 30 sheep, 100 geese, 50 ducks, 50 fowl, 50 turkeys, 800 bags oats, 1,100 barrels potatoes, 10 tubs butter, 24 drums codfish, 200 bushels turnips, 5 tons hay, 3 boxes harness, 15 ladders, 36 boat masts, 50 tons coal.

—A most distressing tragedy occurred at the home of Anthony McHale, near Salisbury, N. B., a few days ago. It seems that during the temporary absence from the house of Mr. and Mrs. McHale, their son, a young deaf and dumb lad, got down a gun and was pointing it at his little sister, aged five years, in play. Suddenly the heavy charge which was in the gun exploded, tearing off the top of the little girl's head and killing her instantly.
