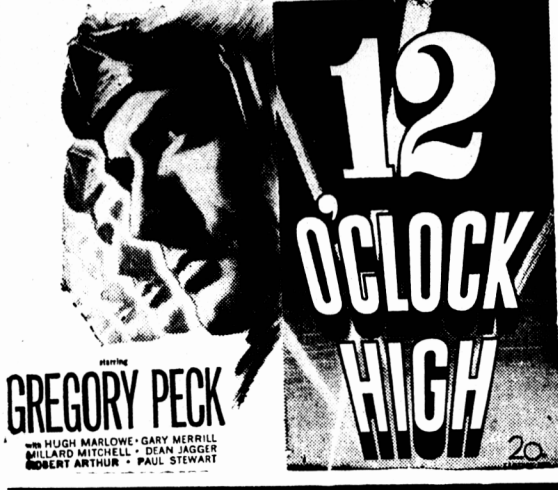

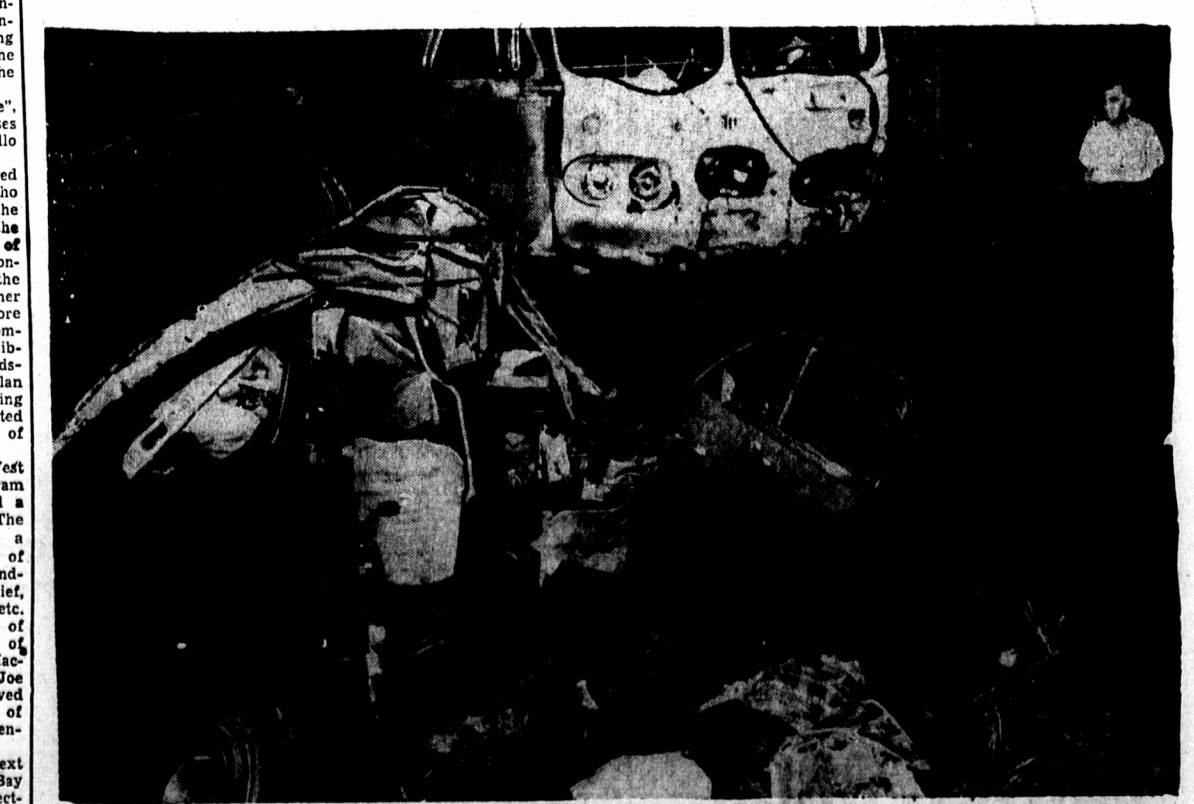

Head-On Crash Between Bus, Car Near Bradford, Claims 6 Lives



Six persons were killed, one young family of three entirely wiped out, when their automobile crashed head on into a bus four miles north of Bradford, Ont. The accident occurred when bus, travelling south to Toronto, from Barrie, was forced into a wrong lane when it was side-swiped by a dump truck. The passenger car, just behind the truck, was forced under the front of the bus. The impact was so great that it hurled all the occupants of the car in which the six died on to the ground except the driver.
