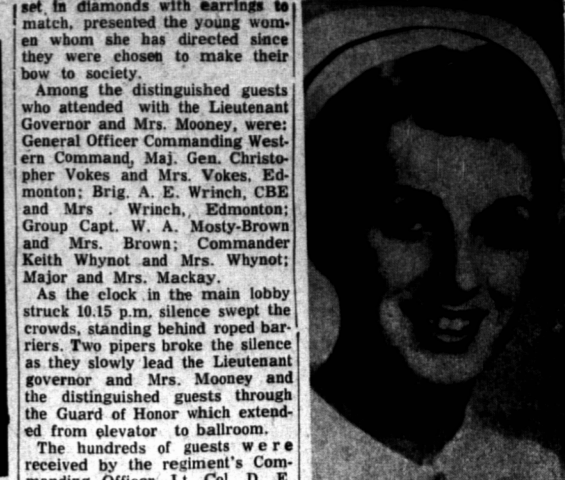

Wedding Cake Can't Be Rushed

PRESTON, Ont. (CP) — Mrs. Harold Thorman, an attractive housewife, has been practically "brought up on wedding cake."

A third generation specialist in making wedding cakes, Mrs. Thorman won't disclose her recipe—"that's a deep secret which was passed on by my grandfather—but she does pass on cake hints.

"A wedding cake should be baked six weeks before the wedding date and decorations should be started a week prior to the ceremony.

"Decorating takes four days. First, an almond paste is smoothed on and allowed to harden for 24 hours. A base of white icing is applied to layers and when dry, the icing is repeated.

"True color instead of 'off-shade tones' is reached, says Mrs. Thorman, by using a half-pound of sifted icing sugar combined with one pound of colorless margarine. Also the addition of gelatin in icing makes it easier to mould into intricate designs.

"Making the cake includes using four smaller cakes for the bottom layer to simplify cutting. Mrs. Thorman recommends a strong batter so that the cake won't sink from the weight of icing and decorations.

"I prefer light cakes because the dark usually have more truis and their juices tend to stain paste to the outside icing," she says.

Fresh flowers in a small water-filled container attached to the top of the cake is Mrs. Thorman's favorite decoration.

Mrs. Thorman learned the art from her grandfather and father while apprenticing as bakers in Scotland. They continued their trade after coming to Preston in 1913.

"Wedding cakes don't claim all my time, though I complete about three a week in 21 hours," says Mrs. Thorman. She finds time to bake specialty cakes and party favors.

"With two ovens I can bake more than one cake at a time. I am always looking for new ideas and I'm willing to try anything once."

COOK'S CORNER

CHOCOLATE MARSHMALLOW SQUARES

1-2 cup melted butter
 1 cup white sugar
 1 egg beaten
 2 squares melted chocolate
 Pinch of salt
 1-2 cup milk
 1 teaspoon vanilla
 1 teaspoon baking powder
 1 cup flour

Cream butter and sugar, add egg and melted chocolate, milk and dry ingredients. Bake 1-2 hour in moderate oven.

Spread marshmallows on top of hot cake, put back in oven till marshmallows soften a trifle. And when cool, ice.

ICING

1 square melted chocolate
 1 piece butter
 A little cream or milk, thickened with icing sugar.
