hearts from dummy. East followed with the four. South decided that East very likely did not have the queen, and therefore did not play the jack to try to get to his hand immediately.

When he played the eight instead, West won with the queen, and it was all over but the shouting. Declarer was able to enter his hand later with the heart jack to cash the jack of clubs and thus make twelve tricks.

It is of interest to note that North would have made twelve tricks also if he had been partnered with the East hand, a bid that thirteen tricks would have been available had West been his partner.

This is by way of endorsing our endorsement to North's unilateral slam bid, though we recognize that South might have had a hand which would provide no play whatever for twelve tricks. After all, there's a limit to how close to the vest you can play them.

South's play of the hand is likewise endorsed. He avoided the trap of trying to establish dummy's long suit by leading the A-K and another heart. This method of play would have succeeded in establishing the hearts all right, but would have left dummy with a losing diamond.

The line of play chosen by South had the merit of combining the establishment of the heart suit with the creation at the same time of an all-important entry to his hand.

Announces Amnesty For Algerian Rebels

PARIS (AP)—President Charles de Gaulle Tuesday night announced a sweeping amnesty for Nationalist rebels being held in Algerian prisons and some of their leaders detained in France.

The president also commuted to life imprisonment the death sentences passed on all categories of prisoners under French jurisdiction in cases where all legal recourse has been exhausted.

Messali Hadj, a veteran Nationalist whose influence has waned during the six years that he has been detained in France, was ordered set free. He has been held since 1956 on the bleak Belle Ile off the Atlantic coast of southern France. He will not be permitted to return to Algeria, however.

Strange Object Is Identified

BATHURST, N.B. (CP)—Several dozen persons reported seeing a bright red and gold object in the western sky here Tuesday and later located it was an aircraft 100 miles away.

Radio station CKBC here said it identified the object through the St. Margarets, N.B. RCAF radar base as a B-47 jet bomber from the U.S. Base at Limestone, Me. It was believed the sighting was possible because of the 30,000-foot altitude of the plane and the reflection of the sun on it in a clear winter sky.
