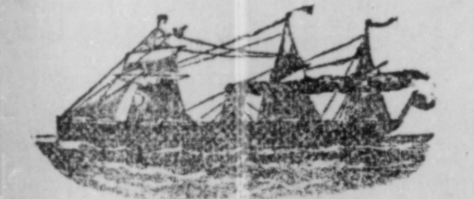

**FIRE AT AMHERST.**—The residence with its contents at Leamington, valued at over \$3000, owned and occupied by James Nelson, was destroyed by fire at about three o'clock this morning.

**POLICE COURT.**—At the Police Court this morning 5 men for being drunk were fined \$2 or 10 days. One of these men named Henry Craham told the following story. He arrived from Cambridgeport Mass. on Friday last, and on Saturday morning went down to the railway station to get his trunk. On the way down he fell in with Peter Keenan, a gentleman of leisure of this city, whom Craham had known before he went to the States. Keenan told his pitiable story; no money, no food, no drink, and Craham, the good natured "stood the drinks" and bought a bottle of rum. This the pair took out the road in the neighborhood of the Driving Park and Craham soon got helplessly drunk. He fell down and went to sleep and on waking up found he had been robbed of a ring, a watch and chain, and \$140 in cash. He made his way into town where he was quickly pounced on by a man in blue and taken to the police station. Here he told his tale of woe, and two officers were sent after the missing money. As a result of their search they arrested Peter Keenan and George Donovan to whom it seems Keenan had turned over the cash. Donovan before being arrested had given away many of the bills to his friends, some of whom were richer to the extent of a five or ten by his generosity. The policemen succeeded in getting back about \$90 as well as the watch and the ring. This morning the prisoners explained to the Stipendiary Hazard, who upon hearing all the evidence in the case, sentenced them to be sent up to the Supreme Court.
