The Indictment Against Riel.

REGINA, July 8.
Louis Riel has been formally handed over to the civil authorities for trial. The indictment against him consists of six counts. It was read to him yesterday, and his trial was set down for the 20th inst. The indictment charges Riel with high treason, in that being a British subject he traitorously and maliciously made war on the Queen, and attempted to subvert and destroy the Constitutional Government of the Realm, etc., to the evil example of all others in like case offering.

Traffic in Young Girls—A Sensation.

LONDON, July 2.
The Pall Mall Gazette's article on the traffic in young girls, for immoral purposes, is creating a great sensation in London. The St. James Gazette signified in the article as the vilest obscenity ever issued from the public press of Great Britain. The question of criminally prosecuting the Editors and publishers was discussed in Parliament yesterday.
The Pall Mall Gazette has been suppressed from the Railway book stalls, but it has an enormous sale in the streets of the metropolis.

An Act of Odious Aggression.

PARIS, July 8.
General Courcey, has addressed a manifesto to the people of Annan, denouncing the attack on his army, as an act of odious aggression.

LONDON, July 8.
Gladstone has promised to support the new Ministry in the Russian and Egyptian negotiations, and in all important national aims.

Abandoning Coercion.

LONDON, July 8.
The Government has formally announced its policy of abandonment of coercion in Ireland.
