REPAIR LIGHT PLANT - It was expected that repairs to one of the power units at the Gordon Electric Co. would be completed last evening with full power being restored for the first time in three days. A cracked head in the 60 H.P. diesel engine threw a heavy load on the remaining two units at peak periods but service was not entirely interrupted at any time.

SAD NEWS RECEIVED - Mrs. Patrick Ryan, Summerside, has received word of the death in Wilmington, Mass., of her brother-in-law, Mr. Andrew J. Kennedy of that city, formerly of Souris, P.E.I. Mr. Kennedy was killed as he walked along a Wilmington Street when he was struck by a car which hurled him into the path of another, the second vehicle passing over him. He was rushed to hospital, but was pronounced dead on arrival. Mr. Kennedy was 72 years of age, and was a retired foreman carpenter with Boston & Maine Railway. He was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Kennedy of Souris. His mother was Miss Elizabeth Mooney before her marriage. Besides his wife, the former Lenora McLellan, he leaves to mourn two sons, James and Harold of Wilmington, Mass., and five grandchildren. A brother, Mr. George Kennedy of New York, also survives.

Dr. Bowness To Attend Fox And Mink Show Here

Dr. E. Rendle Bowness, director of fur animal research with the Toronto Elevators Limited, Toronto, Ont., will be on hand for this year's fox and mink show being held at Charlottetown on November 20th to 23rd under the auspices of the P. E. I. Fox Breeders Association.

Dr. Bowness will direct a pelting demonstration on Thursday afternoon following the completion of the judging. In the evening he will be heard in an address pertaining to fox and mink ranching after which he is scheduled to answer questions from the breeders present. Rev. Father J. L. Madigan, C.Ss.R., of the Redemptorist Mission Band of Holy Redeemer Rectory, Charlottetown, is conducting his first official mission on Prince Edward Island at the R. C. A. F. station at Summerside.

Father Madigan has been on Prince Edward Island for only two weeks, and has the distinction of conducting the first mission ever held at this R. C. A. F. base. The mission comprises two weeks specialized spiritual exercises for the Catholic personnel. The first week, which commenced on Sunday, November 11, is for married and single women of the personnel. The second week, commencing Sunday, November 18, is for officers and men at the base. The mission will officially close Sunday evening, November 25.

Father Madigan states that he is much impressed by the spirit of faith, goodwill, and sincerity in the Catholic personnel, and speaks very highly of the co-operation given by the officials of the R. C. A. F. base. Before coming to Prince Edward Island, Father Madigan spent ten months giving missions throughout Newfoundland. Prior to that he was stationed at Red House, Saint John, New Brunswick. He is a graduate of St. Michael's College, Toronto, and also studied at St. Mary's College, Brockville, Ontario. Father Madigan was ordained at St. Alphonse Seminary, Woodstock, Ontario, in June 1947.

A board was needed, for instance, to handle purchase of butter. Spokesmen for the opposition groups welcomed the plan to establish a board. Some suggested action to help the Canadian dairy industry.

body regarding the diversion of the railway tracks in Summerside and the erection of a new freight shed. Councillor Gorrill of the finance committee read the authority of the Provincial Government, which had been received, to issue debentures amounting to \$300,000 to be dated Dec. 15th, 1951, and said that tenders would be called for these at once. Councillor Driscoll reported that the routine work of cleaning up the leaves in the town was being carried out. He said that repairs had been made to the bridge at Summerside East, near George Keys. Mayor Wedge commended Councillor Driscoll and his committee in having this work done and said that he had received some favourable comments from citizens on the improved approach to the town. Councillor Schurman presented the police report, which contained the report of Chief of Police White on the successful excursion at the time of the Royal visit of the Summerside school children to Charlottetown. His Worship thanked the members of the council for the support they had given him in making this plan possible and said

he was happy to report that not a single accident had occurred on the trip. He paid high tribute to Chief of Police White and his assistants for the manner in which they had carried out their duties and also had a special word of praise for the firemen, nurses and all who had made the excursion so successful. Councillor Schurman presented a resolution that due to congested conditions on Water Street that no licenses be granted to new taxi stands and that no new licenses be granted to any new taxi business without the approval of the police committee. The resolution was passed unanimously. Councillor Morrison said that all was well at the electric light plant. The engines have been cleaned up and are in readiness for the heavy fall and winter load.

Damage Repaired
Councillor Sheen, reporting on the damage along the Summerside waterfront, done during the recent storm, said that most of this had now been repaired. He said that up to the present several applications have been received for the position of librarian but no one has as yet been appointed to the position. Councillor Steele presented a very splendid report on the amount of taxes collected in Summerside. He said that 96 or 97 percent of all taxes had been paid and this would be further increased by December first.

Councillor Schurman said that in regard to the complaints received regarding the congestion in traffic on Water Street at the freight shed that this would be only temporary. It was due, he explained, to the new long trucks being used by the C.N.R. and that arrangements were being made to have the doors in the shed widened in order to permit the trucks to back in far enough to overcome any congestion.
