## Chicago White Sox Sign Slugging Larry Doby

CHICAGO (AP)—The Chicago White Sox 18-year search for a reliable cleanup hitter apparently ended Tuesday when they ob- tained slugging Larry Doby from the Cleveland Indians.

In their biggest deal since the departure of trade master Frank Lane to the St. Louis Cardinals several weeks ago, the Sox gave the Indians shortstop Jim Busby, a straight player transaction.

The Sox, who have finished third in the American League race the last three years, long have had a weakness in the No. 4 spot in the batting order. They haven't had a consistent long-ball hitter since Zeke Bonura drove 440 run across home plate for them from 1934 to 1937.

**FIRST NEGRO**

Doby, the first Negro player in the American League, potentially fills the bill. The 30-year-old veteran of eight full seasons with the Indians has a major league lifetime batting mark of .236 and a slugging average of .502.

He has blasted 202 homers and driven in 731 runs. Last season, despite a wrist ailment, he hit .291 in 131 games, including 26 homers, 17 doubles and five triples. His RBI total was 75.

In 1952 Doby led the league in homers, with 32, and runs scored, 154. His 32 homers and 126 RBIs were tops in 1954. He has made the all star game every year since 1949.

Carrasquel, once regarded as one of the finest shortstops in the league, slowed down this season both defensively and at the plate. He hit .256 and drove in 52 runs. Busby, obtained from Washington was fift in the outfield but batted only .239.

## 10 Ring Greats Elected To Boxing Hall Of Fame

NEW YORK (AP)—Ten former ring greats, including Gene Tunney, Mickey Walker, Benny Leonard and Harry Greb, have been elected to boxing's Hall of Fame.

The announcement was made Monday at the dedication ceremony for the Hall of Fame at the Ring magazine offices in the Madison Square Garden building.

Others named to the Hall of Fame Monday were Sam Langford, the Boston Tar Baby, who fought from 1902 to 1923, former featherweight champion Terry McGovern and Abe Attell and Barbados Joe Walcott, onetime welterweight king. These four were voted in by the old timers' committee of 20.

Two heavyweights of the early 1900s, Britain's William Thompson Bendigo, and William (Bill) Richmond, the first American heavyweight of note, were selected for the list of "ancients" by the directors of the Hall of Fame.

The addition of the 10 made a total of 34 chosen for the hall in two years.

## Prystai Again Sent To Wings

DETROIT (CP)—Detroit Red Wings Monday acquired Metro Prystai from Chicago for the second time in a trade for Ed Sandford. Both are forwards.

It was the second time in five years that Prystai came to Detroit from the Black Hawks in a National Hockey League deal. The centre, born in Yorkton, Sask., originally came to the Wings as part of a nineplayer swap that sent goalie Harry Lumley and defenceman Jack Stewart to the Hawks. He went back to Chicago in mid-season last year.

# Al Rollins Blanks Boston Bruins 2-0 At St. Louis

ST. LOUIS (CP)—Goalie Al Rollins registered his first shutout of the National Hockey League season Tuesday night, as Chicago Black Hawks blanked Boston 2-0 to move into a three-way tie for second place with Bruins and New York Rangers.

In one of four Chicago home games shifted to St. Louis by agreement, 5,668 fans saw the Hawks handle the Boston attack with ease. It was the Bruins' second straight whitewash, following their scoreless tie in Detroit Sunday night.

### TALENT HUNT

Sir.—We of the Sydney Police Athletic Club of which Mr. M. J. MacDonald and myself are co-matchmakers are on the hunt for any boxing talent available in P. E. I. and we hope that our letter will be seen by all boxers in your province.

First we have in mind the staging of elimination bouts that will eventually lead to the crowning of Maritime Bantam and Featherweight champions. Presently there are no Maritime rulers in either the 118 or 126 pound divisions.

Our recognized Cape Breton Bantam champ is Johnnie Devison who is 20 years old and has had 12 bouts and our featherweight title holder is Allie Steele, 19 years old with 5 fights to his credit.

It is from this point that we hope to make the start and we hope that bantam and featherweights from our sister provinces will throw their hats in the ring and be willing to take part in a series of elimination bouts that will end with the crowning of Maritime champs in both divisions.

We of the Police Club, having a small club seating 450, have been doing our utmost to keep boxing to the fore in Cape Breton. Our boxing program is used to finance the sponsoring of juvenile hockey, baseball and softball teams.

We pay a reasonable guarantee to anyone who may be a contestant in the main event on any of our cards and also pay travelling hotel and meal expenses etc., for one.

Our main event bouts usually consist of 8 three-minute, 8 two minute or 6 three-minute rounds depending upon the age, weight and experience of the principals. Accompanying the headline feature we usually have 2 six-round semi-final bouts and round the card out with 3 four-round matches, which is, as a rule, local talent.

Two fighters we have training at our club presently, Gordie MacDougall, 20 years old and 156 pounds and Bobby Moore, 18 years old and 144 pounds, have reached the stage where they are able to be featured on main events and draw good crowds especially when outside talent is brought in to fight them.

We trust everyone will take note of the weights given as we have a scale at the club and the boys weigh-in every week under our supervision.

Johnny Nemis, former Maritime welterweight champ and no doubt well known in P. E. I. especially in Charlottetown where he fought on several occasions, is the boxing instructor and trainer at the clubroom. He coaches boxing to members of the Sydney police force as well as to a large number of outsiders and most of the boxers fighting out of Cape Breton are under his management.

The late Ernie MacKinnon, dubbed the Law Point Larruper, was a product of Nemis' hands and the Police A. C. is where MacKinnon got his start.

Ernie started his career off with a rush winning 19 bouts without having been defeated or even held to a draw. Cape Breton fans in general and Nemis in particular were sure that by 1936 Ernie would be a Canadian champion but that was not how it would have it.

Another prize example of Nemis' astute tutelage and wide knowledge of training methods is 17 year-old Roy MacNeil who got his start at the Police A. C. and is now featured on many televised bouts at the Palace Peer in Toronto.

We will soon be moving into new quarters which will be more spacious and in which we will have other facilities for our boxers and boxing classes.
