TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The General Assembly.

OTTAWA, June 11. The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of Canada met in Bank Church to-day. Dr. Grant, the retiring Moderator, preached from Hebrews 12th, 28. "We receiving a kingdom which cannot be moved." After the calling of the roll Dr. Laing, of Dundas, was chosen Moderator. The answers to the address to the Queen and to the Governor General were read by Dr. Grant, and Dr. Burns moved that the thanks of the Assembly be given to the retiring Moderator for his efficient service and his admirable sermon. This was seconded and passed with applause. The hours of business were fixed and several committees were appointed.

OTTAWA, June 10. The Methodist conference continued its sitting yesterday. The following resolution, moved by Rev. Dr. Douglass, seconded by Dr. Alexander, was carried unanimously: Resolved, That this conference memorialize the ensuing general conference to legislate for the establishment of a sisterhood, which shall efficiently aid the pastorate by visiting the rich and poor, by skilled nursing of the sick, by evangelizing the masses, by engaging in general mission and benevolent service, which women alone can render to the church of Christ.

Halifax News.

HALIFAX, June 11. The Grand Lodge of Freemasons were entertained at a grand banquet by their Halifax brethren to-night. An elaborate programme of toasts was presented, and a most enjoyable time spent.

Mrs. M. Kenzie, aged 57, the janitress of the Mission House here, dropped dead to-night.

Rev. James Buckley, aged 80, a retired Methodist Minister, died to-night. He was a native of Ireland and came to this country 70 years ago, and served half a century in the Ministry in various parts of the province.

Royalty and Vice-Royalty.

QUEBEC, June 11. The Duke and Duchess of Connaught arrived here yesterday from their fishing expedition to Metapedia. They were met at the Queen's Wharf by a large number of citizens, headed by the Mayor, who welcomed them to Quebec. The distinguished party then drove direct to the citadel where they are the guests of Lord and Lady Stanley, who gave a dinner party in their honor.

Acts Reserved.

OTTAWA, June 11. The Mail's Ottawa special says: "The Manitoba Government has been notified that forty-six of the fifty-four acts passed by the legislature at its last session, have been allowed by the Federal Government. Among the eight which have been reserved the two most important ones are the Act abolishing State aided separate schools, and the Act providing that English shall be the official language of the province of Manitoba."

Disastrous Fire.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 11. Reports have been received here of a disastrous conflagration in the mining districts of the Ural Mountain. The iron works at Ufalesk and New Jansk, a thousand dwelling houses, four school-houses, three churches, hospitals and magazines are completely destroyed. Forty people were burned to death and 18,000 made homeless by the destruction of the towns.
