HOLY SCRIPTURE

Holy Scripture is the source of comfort, hope and truth, written for our learning. The writers do not attempt to answer many questions which science must ask, nor to provide a prospectus of ancient world history. Their primary aim is spiritual; and although the Bible is rightly thought of as a vehicle of divine revelation, it is also a human book, a record of man's growing realization and understanding of his own nature, and of the nature of God.

The imperfection of the human medium, and the inadequacy of man's earlier conceptions, do not obscure the main point and purpose of the whole, which is to give an answer to the fundamental questions: "What is man? What does God require of him, and how can he find the power which will enable him to meet this demand—a demand to which he must in some way respond?"

And while none would claim that every part of the book is of equal spiritual value, yet, from beginning to end, the world, and the whole of man's life, are related to God, its creator and redeemer. Its view of the world is religious. In his latest book Bertrand Russell rightly says: "What our world needs is a rational creative belief in a God who is not a deity but a force." But the Bible, in spite of its realistic view of man's na-

ture, is essentially a book of hope; and through what they have read therein Christians have always believed that life has a meaning and a purpose.

What the book has done for human life through the ages is beyond all computation. Its very words and phrases have entered into the structure of the common speech of the western world, and many to-day use its words and even accept its standards of conduct with little or no realization of their source.

The book is ethical through and through. It does not indeed provide a legalistic system, a code of behaviour, which, as man's common life becomes more complex and ethical problems more intricate, would need constant revision; but it does set before men a standard, a point of reference, an ultimate sanction, which offers him the guidance he needs as he is faced by the moral choices which none can escape. It's message and its view of the purpose of life are as relevant to-day as ever.

The testimony of countless Christians has been that to read this book with receptivity of mind and heart, and with a sincere desire to discover the secret of the good life, is to find in an unending source of enlightenment and guidance the ground of faith, and the key which opens the gate into the Kingdom of God.

Meeting Of Cerebral Palsy Group

The Cerebral Palsy Parents Group met at the Y. M. C. A. on Tuesday, March 10th.

A large number of parents of such handicapped children were present for the meeting, presided over by the president, Mrs. Dan Farquharson, and were much encouraged by the talk of the guest speaker, Mrs. Clifford Birt who was a speech and occupational teacher in Holland. She told about the work being done in Holland for these children.

In the course of her talk she demonstrated a number of articles which could be employed and methods used to interest the child. Many of these articles she made herself and told the parents they could be made at home and in this way assist them. She stressed the fact that the physically handicapped children can be educated and that some of the most severely handicapped have become lawyers, doctors, teachers, etc., but said that a sound mind behind a crippled child will also become crippled unless adequate channels for expression are provided.

A film was also shown, entitled "Search". It told the life story of a little boy, who was severely handicapped by cerebral palsy, how he struggled through life, the attitude the public took towards him, and later how he was helped by proper training.

During the business part of the meeting a brief was prepared and presented to the government for consideration. The next meeting will be held in April at the Y. M. C. A.

At the close of the meeting a vote of thanks was extended to the guest speaker.
