

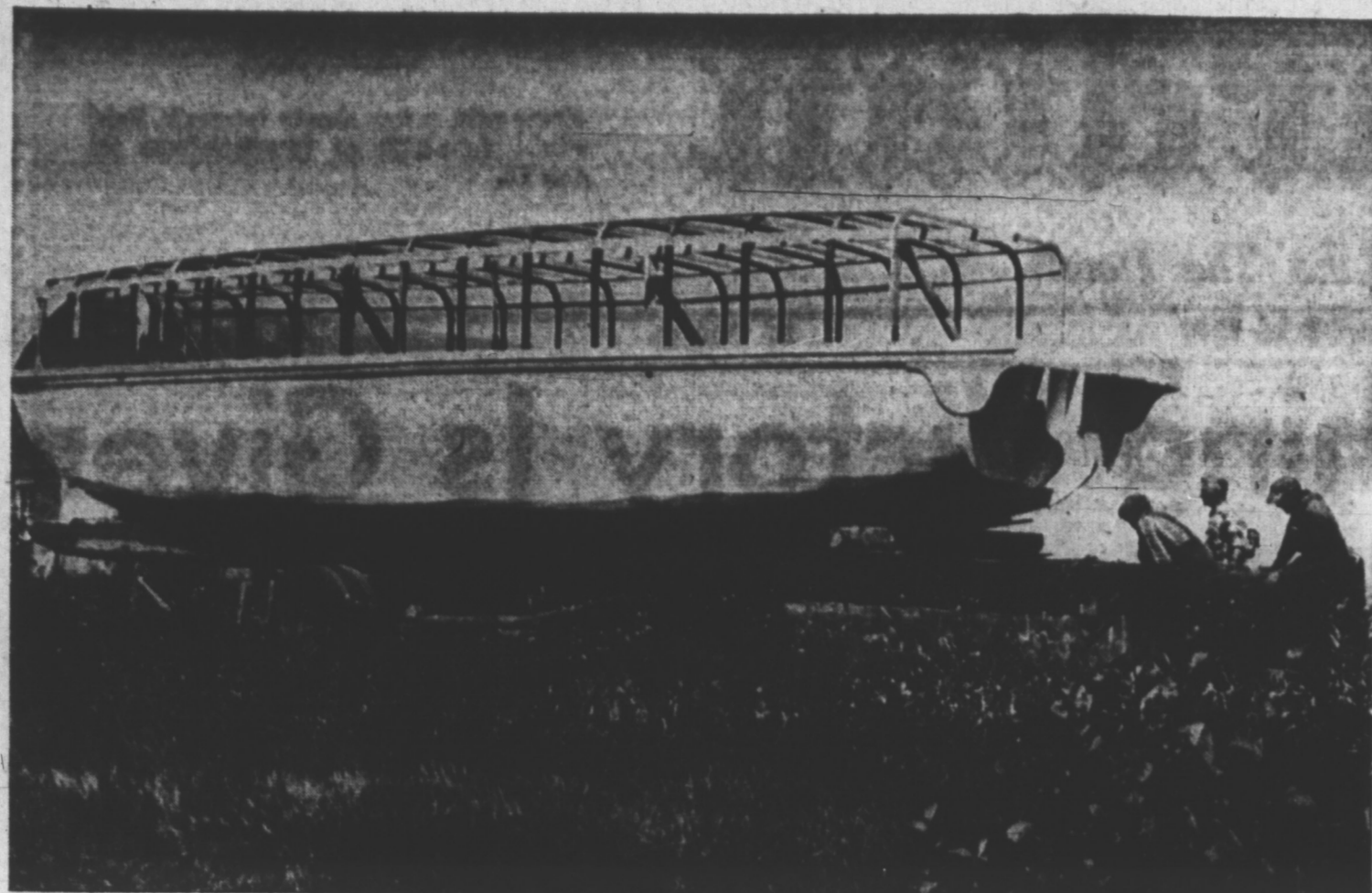
Alberton Boat Seized By Fisheries Officers

A 40-foot lobster fishing boat, reportedly owned and operated by John J. Gavin of Alberton South, was seized early yesterday morning by officers of the federal Department of fisheries.

First intercepted at Alberton harbour entrance by officers E.M. McKay, J. Robichaud, Reg Eidershaw and First Mate Donald Iversen at the controls of a motor launch, the fishing boat was followed into the harbour and taken in tow to the "Lama" for transfer to an undischarged port.

Officers of the Gavin boat, with buoy attached, were picked up by the officers.

The 300 horse power high speed Chrysler-powered launch carried aboard the "Lama" (formerly the "Cygnus") is proving a capable weapon in the fight against illegal fishing. Combining high speed, a powerful searchlight and expert seamanship the launch has figured in the seizure of two Alberton-owned boats since the spring lobster season closed.

Fidel Castro Leaves For Unknown Place

HAVANA (AP)—Premier Fidel Castro had a long talk Thursday with his district naval commander at Cienfuegos, then flew off for an unknown destination. His conference with navy commander Herminio Carballo heightened speculation that what the revolutionary government calls conspirators have landed or may attempt a landing in the strategic central part of the island.

There was no official word on Castro's activities in Las Villas province. The first press dispatches in four days reached Havana from the province but telephone communications still were out. Unconfirmed reports said that more than 500 suspects were detained in Las Villas.

Moist Weather Causes Blight

Moist weather on P.E.I. since August 4 has caused late blight to become quite active, it is noted by the P.E.I.-N.S. weekly potato bulletin. The fungus has been in continuous sporulation for the past several days and the bulletin advises that advantage should be taken of the first break in the weather to spray again. Second brood flea beetles are beginning to appear, and aphids are numerous in some potato fields. Malathion should be applied at regular intervals during the next few weeks, it is advised. The bulletin is prepared by F. M. Canon and L.C. Calbeck of the research laboratory in Charlottetown.

Heroic Driver Stays In Cab

MONTREAL (CP) — The city health commission decided at a three-hour emergency meeting Thursday that Montreal's present polio outbreak is not alarming although extra anti-polio precautions should be taken.

The health officials said the situation would not reach epidemic proportions unless the number of polio victims in the city jumped to 120.

The latest polio count was 90 victims from Montreal. Altogether, there were 205 victims of the crippling disease in hospitals, but many were from rural and northern points. Thirteen persons have died from polio.

The health commission decided to set up two special emergency committees.

One, headed by Dr. J.H. Charbonneau, medical director of Montreal's Pasteur Hospital, will watch for epidemic signs and take necessary action.

The other committee, headed by T.J. Lafreniere, chief engineer of the provincial health department, will order hygienic action to rid the metropolis of possible breeding places for polio.

The commission decided to keep swimming pools and parks open because children need fresh air and modest doses of sun. Children's wading pools, already shut down because of the polio threat, will remain closed.
