MONDAY

Six-year-old Marion Murray, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leo J. Murray, 152 Hillsborough Street, Charlottetown won the first prize of \$1,000 in the Islanders Hockey Ship Contest.

Second prize of \$250 was won by Frank MacKenzie, 64 Rochford Street. The third ticket, although sold to an employee of Canada Packers, has not been turned in as yet.

Arrangements have been practically completed for the hiring of Randolph (Randy) Edwards as minor league instructor and coach in Charlottetown this summer.

Edwards, a native of Everett, Mass., and Athletic Director at Community Centre, Brookline, Mass., will arrive here around the middle of June to commence his duties of coaching and instructing all players of Junior age and under.

The young coach comes here highly recommended by Brooklyn Dodgers' scout, Bill O'Connor. He is a graduate of Boston University and a good all-round athlete.

That there are still some very large trout in the Dunk River, and some wily fishermen in Summerside, was proven yesterday by Mr. Arthur Larkin who came home victoriously with two large trout, the larger of which weighed six pounds and measured 24 inches when taken from the water.

Mr. Larkin admitted that a battle royal resulted before the huge trout was landed and modestly gave credit to the able assistance of Mr. Emmet Trainor of the Post Office staff who handled the net with which the trout was finally brought to the bank.

Mr. Larkin does not propose to have this trout for breakfast. Instead he plans on preserving it for posterity by stuffing it and thus prove to all that there was a really big one which did not get away.

The ferry service between Wood Islands and Caribou will resume Friday morning, following announcement by the Northumberland Ferries Ltd. of word from Ottawa that their contract had been renewed for a two-year period. The old contract was for one year only.

One significant change will permit the making of a limited number of reservations by truck for the first and second sailings each morning from each terminal. Another important change is that from now on trucks loaded with perishables and livestock will have to have reservations in advance to permit the company to know what they can expect on any sailing. They make such reservations up to the space available and henceforth there will be no priority without a reservation. Requests for reservations must be made at the Charlottetown office at least 48 hours in advance.

Mr. David Peacock, of the Dept. of Agriculture, Charlottetown, was guest speaker at meeting of directors of the Alberton Prince County Exhibition Association held at the Court House, Alberton, Friday evening, April 24th. Mr. Lester Wallace, president, presided. Minutes were read by Mr. Winston Currie, secretary.

Many changes in the present prize list were recommended by Mr. Peacock and after considerable discussion adopted with the result that the 1953 Alberton Exhibition prize list will show many improvements and greatly increased prizes in almost all cases. Other improvements recommended by Mr. Peacock included the arranging of buildings, pens and the show ring.

TUESDAY

Prince Street School won the City Girls' Interscholastic Basketball championship last night by defeating West Kent 23-20 in the third and deciding game of the play-offs. West Kent won the opening game 29-27 and Prince Street came back to take the second contest 19-18.

Barbara Wran was high scorer for the winners with eight points. Barbara Whitlock, Rodgers and MacPherson were runner-up with four each. Lucy Smith scored 18 of West Kent's 20 points. The remaining two points were scored by Campbell.

Mr. and Mrs. P. W. Turner leave on Friday morning for Chicago where the former will attend a meeting of the Board of Directors of Rotary International, to be followed by a meeting at Lake Placid, New York, where more than 1200 Rotarians will assemble.

The party will leave Lake Placid by special train to take passage from New York City on the "Mountains" which they have chartered for the trip to La Havre, France, where they will disembark and proceed by special trains to Paris where the International meeting of Rotary will be held, lasting one week.

Mr. Turner, who is Canadian Director on the International Board, has been named to preside over several sessions of the convention including the British Commonwealth of Nations dinner, which is an outstanding event in the annual meeting of Rotary International.

Following the convention, Mr. and Mrs. Turner will proceed to England for the Coronation and afterwards to tour England and Scotland for about three weeks before returning to Canada.

Summerside Rotarians were hosts last evening to representatives from the Summerside churches, the various service clubs, the Summerside High School supervisor, the Canadian Legion and Department of Physical Fitness, all meeting together in a round table discussion on the problem of juvenile delinquency in Summerside.

The object of last night's open meeting was to get the views of the leaders of all these organizations as to the best means to be adopted in combating juvenile delinquency and to provide for the future welfare of the youth of the town.

Mayor Wedge said that he and his Council would be glad to cooperate fully in any plans for the betterment of the youth of the town which might come out of the meeting.

OTTAWA, April 27.—(Special)—As a sequel to representations made by J. Watson MacNaught, parliamentary assistant to Fisheries Minister Sinclair, and Liberal member for Prince, Transport Minister Chevrier announced by this afternoon that a special early morning scheduled trip would be made by the car ferry "Abegweit".

Beginning on June 16, the ferry will leave Borden at 6:30 a.m., leave Cape Tormentine for the return trip at 7:45 and be back at Borden in time to make her regular morning run at 9:10 o'clock.

While there have been early ferry trips for a long period, they have hitherto been unscheduled and hence have not been popular on account of uncertainty. The season for the early trip will begin from June 16 to October 15 this year.

A newcomer to the local restaurant field, Mr. Dan Chan, well known Summerside restaurateur, is entering the local picture with the purchase yesterday of White's Restaurant on Queen Street.

The old established business operated by Mr. Thomas White is presently closed for renovations, but is expected to reopen under its new management within 10 days. Mr. White personally has made no plans for the future as yet but will remain in Charlottetown.

The change in management of the restaurant has been pending for some time and yesterday final business arrangements were completed.

WEDNESDAY

Successful trout fishing continues in the Prince County area with some beautiful large trout having been brought to Summerside within the last few days, and placed on display to add evidence to the stories of the big ones that got away.

Among the larger ones seen on exhibition was the one brought in by Arthur Larkin, a six-pounder and measuring 24 inches when brought from the water, a freepour by Preston Noonan; a three and a half pounder by Cappy Landry; and two three-pounders by Keith Champion.—S.

Hon. Douglas MacKinnon, Minister of Public Works and Highways, completed an inspection tour of the paved highways of the province last evening after an active week which also took him over many miles of gravelled roads.

In speaking of his inspection the Minister said "I was agreeably surprised to find the highways in fairly good condition, especially the experimental portions. The pavement west of Summerside is better this spring than it has been for years, while the Seaman mix experiment in the vicinity of O'Leary has stood up fairly well."

"We took our worst beating on the St. Peter's Highway," the Minister continued, "and we expect to start this week on a very bad patch of a mile and a half at Dingwell's Mills to put it in better shape for travel."

Arriving home for an extended leave after a tour of duty in Korea was L. Cpl. J. W. L. Rogers, son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Rogers, 200 Dorchester street, who returned by plane yesterday afternoon.

Cpl. Rogers was enlisted at Number 1 Personnel Depot, Halifax, in August 1950, and proceeded to Picton, Ont., where he trained with the Artillery. However, in January last year he transferred to the Provost Corps and went across the Pacific in March of that year, landing in Japan. He arrived in Korea in September and said there was some tough fighting there, but he did not elaborate nor mention any specific battles. He will remain home on leave until July 2 and expects to receive his discharge in August.

The P. E. I. Fisheries Federation last evening sent the following telegram to Hon. James Sinclair, minister of fisheries, Ottawa: "Following your Department's refusal to reconsider rescinding of new carapace measurement for lobsters, petitions were circulated to fishermen of all fishing centres in this province. Results indicate unanimous opposition to same, as now indicated as well in official protest from P. E. I. Fishermen's Association as well as from this Federation. Urgently request rescinding of this new carapace measurement prior to opening of season. (Sgd) P. E. Island Fisheries Federation per A. Walthen Gaudet, secretary."

Copies of the telegram were sent also to J. Watson MacNaught, parliamentary assistant to the minister of fisheries, W. Chester S. McLure, M.P., J. Angus MacLean, M.P., and T. J. Kieckham, M.P., with the following added: "2,200 lobster fishermen, 40 packing plants and employees demand your immediate intervention for repeal of same."

THURSDAY

A net profit of \$8,743.00 on net sales of some \$48,000 on groceries, feeds, meat, eggs and fruit was the highlight of the yearly financial statement of the Summerside Co-operative Association Ltd. at its second annual meeting last evening. The meeting followed a very enjoyable banquet in the Summerside Baptist hall attended by approximately 175 people.

Four new directors, as suggested by the nomination committee, were approved by the meeting. They were Colin Waugh, Wilmo; Eddie Harrington, Summerside; Emery Lunkeiter, Lunkeiter Road and Leo Farrell, Central Lot 16.

OTTAWA, April 29.—(Special)—Both Prince and King's Counties fared well in supplementary estimates for 1953-54, tabled in the Commons today by Finance Minister Abbott. Total votes in the province for public works, agriculture, and a tentative grant to Charlottetown Exhibition amounted to \$135,875.

Of this total \$119,000 is allocated to Prince County; \$57,000 to King's and \$9,375 to the dual constituency of Queen's.

Members of the City Council are meeting almost daily on their various committees and yesterday some of them were called together three times, morning, afternoon and evening to discuss the different phases of civic government with which they have been entrusted.

Yesterday morning the Mayor and full Council met under the chairmanship of Councillor Storey of the street committee to discuss present pavement conditions.

Mr. J. B. Waterhouse of the Warren Maritimes Limited company which did the paving job on the city streets last summer, accompanied by Mr. Fred Rutherford who represented the company on the job, were in attendance at the meeting as were also Messrs. Barclay and Brown of the MacDonald Inspection Company, responsible for inspection on behalf of the city as the work progressed.

Word has been received at the National Employment Office of the expected layoff this weekend of approximately 45 workers at the Bruce Stewart Co. plant. It is further indicated that an additional 45 may have to be laid off next weekend.

With work on H.M.C.S. Westmount, the naval ship which has been here since July 1951, rapidly nearing completion and no further ships of her size expected to come to this port for refit, the layoff of workers is not unexpected.

Mr. H. E. MacDonald, manager of the plant, said that it was only natural that as work comes to an end there should be a cutback in labor. The company regrets the necessity, but as all efforts to obtain other ships from the Navy have apparently failed there is no alternative.

There is a possibility that a small craft may be received for work to be done, but she is of such a size that at most only one third of the present workmen would be required to handle it. The full staff at present numbers approximately 150 men.

FRIDAY

The following telegram, which is self explanatory, was received yesterday from the Hon. James Sinclair, Federal Minister of Fisheries: "View fact that protests received present no new reasons beyond those previously considered for rescinding new carapace measure and that fishing under new limit has in progress for ten days in another area Maritimes without protest, cannot consider rescinding new measurements."

Leo Doyle, Jr., was elected president of the Charlottetown Branch of the Canadian Legion, B.E.S.L. at the annual meeting held last night.

Other officers include Stanley Bryant, 1st vice president and Frank Rush, 2nd vice president. Charles Hine was re-elected honor. president, and Rev. J. T. Abbott and Rev. T. P. Butler, chaplains.

The executive elected, which includes the retiring president, C. M. Sinclair, was Leo Bradley, Frank Morgan, Plus Bolger, Tony Gallant, Vincent King, Harry Mortimer, Joe Hughes, Spurgeon Leard and Edward Brown. Arthur Hale was elected sergeant-at-arms.

An aircraft ferry-flight unique in the annals of RCAF Station Summerside took off on schedule in the early hours yesterday. Under the experienced hand of P. L. T. M. Webster of Exeter, Ontario, six Harvard and one Expeditor aircraft started the long flight bound for Charlevoix, Alberta. The Harvards flying in two, 3 plane "V" formations led by formation leaders P. L. Webster and F/O George Waugh of Vancouver anticipate that they will require roughly 18 flying hours to complete the 2,500-mile trip. The Expeditor flown by F/O Gord Davis of Lethbridge, Alberta, will act as "mother ship" for the expedition as well as carry needed tools and supplies to be used by the technicians enroute. Piloting the remaining four aircraft are: F/Os Jim Mitchell and Jim Stacey both of Toronto; F/O Doc O'Connor of Sudbury and F/O Bud Stevenson of London, Ontario.

An increase of \$150,000 in sales in the local Co-op Store featured the presentation of the financial statement at the annual meeting held at Prince of Wales College last night. At the same time it was reported that the net profit was over double that of last year.

The meeting approved payment of a rebate on consumer purchases at the local store amounting to eight per cent to shareholders. It also decided on a rebate of two per cent on purchases of feed.

For the first time since the store opened for business all departments showed a desirable profit and all enjoyed a considerable increase in business. The annual statement was read by Mr. J. G. Dennis, supervisor of co-operatives for the Island, who congratulated the directors on the excellent showing.

Workmen are scheduled to begin excavating this morning on the site of the extension to Sunset Lodge on School Street, the contract for the building having been let to Vail Brothers. This announcement was made by the local Advisory Board of the Salvation Army yesterday.

The building extension to the present structure will be 64 ft. x 37 ft. containing 9 double and 5 single sleeping rooms. Provision is made for a spacious sitting room with a fireplace. The dining room will be provided with folding doors leading to the sitting room, enabling the rooms to be combined as one for special occasions. Two smaller dining rooms are provided for each floor. Two large bedrooms for guests of the Lodge are planned and similar accommodation is made for the staff, in addition to new bath installations in the old quarters.
