LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

CHARLOTTETOWN ENGINEERS will meet for drill tonight at 7.30 sharp.

QUITE A SIGHT.—It is estimated that ten thousand people saw the Queen's birthday review of regular troops on the Halifax commons.

PRINCE OF WALES COLLEGE.—The closing exercises of the Prince of Wales College will take place in the Opera House on Wednesday evening, June 2nd.

FISS JUBILER SINGERS.—The Jubilee Singers had another good audience last evening, and all who attended were charmed. They give a concert in Summerside to-night.

GOOD WORK.—The Hillsborough Dairying Company have put a butter plant in their factory this spring. During the first three weeks of May they manufactured 1611 lbs. butter for their own patrons. They started cheese working on the 24th inst. with 8004 lbs mill.

LOBSTERS.—Very heavy catches of lobsters are reported of late in the Tignish district, and fair all along the western shores. This is most pleasing to both packers and fishermen, as prices for canned lobsters are high this season.—Summerside Journal.

HAND CRUSHED.—The Summerside correspondent of the Guardian writes: Mr. Frank McKinnon, fireman in the electric light station here, had his right hand badly crushed Sunday morning while wiping down the engine. The hand got caught between the crosshead and frame of the engine. Dr. McLellan attended the injured man.

AFFAIRS AT SPRINGHILL.—A late Springhill, N. S., despatch says: A very large number of men have been thrown out of work during the past week in addition to the large batches of miners who were discharged in the winter. The union has called a special meeting to consider the situation and things are beginning to assume an unsettled state. An attempt was made during the week to set fire to manager Cowan's stable. Fortunately the fire was discovered and put out before much damage was done.

THE STANLEY.—The Picton Standard says: The Stanley after waiting a number of days for the wind to abate, made an attempt to go on the Marine slip on Saturday. Not having the services of the man "who never had an accident" at the work, things were not probably arranged right and instead of settling properly on the keel blocks the weight came somewhere else, with the result that considerable damage was done and the Stanley is now at the wharf again, where she will have to be delayed for repairs at the slip.

Montreal Star: Mr. Laurier might arrange his plebiscite vote so that all who simply put ballots in the box be counted as against Prohibition, while all who insert \$10 bills for the first year's direct taxes be reckoned as voting "yea."

L'Avant Garde: "It appears that Mr. Francois Langelier is to be made an additional Judge of the Exchequer Court with Judge Burbridge. Two judges in the place of one: this means an annual increase in salaries of \$6,000. Here is the Liberal economy so much talked about."

Prices for pure-bred stock are on the upward trend. At the sale of Polled Aberdeen Angus cattle last month, the property of Wallace Estill of Missouri, the three-year-old bull Gay Lad sold for \$825. A two-year-old brought \$600 and another \$500. Thirteen bulls sold for \$3,865, an average of \$297 each. The cows and heifers were not in such active demand, but 25 head brought an average of \$160 each. The average is the best of the year so far for any breed. The cattle trade is looking up.
