

Lord Napier who commanded the Abyssinian expedition, is about to succeed H. R. H. the Duke of Cambridge as Commander-in-Chief of the British Army. It is the first time that an engineer officer has attained any very high distinction, although the Engineers are the best educated and the finest theoretical and practical technicians in the entire Army.

LATE TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The Germans claim that the bombardment has far exceeded the French military authorities to evacuate all the outposts of forts Negout and Roissy. On Sunday Fort de Noisy made no demonstration, but remained perfectly silent all the day long.

On Sunday balloon news was received from Paris with dates up to the previous Friday. The chief item of interest is that on Friday a meeting was held at Mayor's suburban, the municipal authorities, and that they should be more military energy displayed by the authorities than there had been.

The bombardment continues upon all the forts to the north of Paris. The French military authorities are confident that the men who want for military purposes, and that she possesses the best artillery in Europe.

SPECIAL TELEGRAMS TO THE CHARLOTTETOWN ASSOCIATED PRESS.

Sackville, Jan. 10, 1871.—Austria is reported much dissatisfied with the protocol to be submitted by England to the conference. The Roumanian Government has assured the Sublime Porte of its loyalty to the Treaty of 1856. Bismarck has expressed his reluctance to accept Granville's denial of violation of neutrality.

The released Fenians left Liverpool for New York on Saturday. Trochu has issued a proclamation assuring the Parisians that Boukaki is marching on Nancy, and on Bellort.—Paris letters indicate danger of a riot. French approximate losses at Bassemont—9000 Germans and 4000 French.—The Germans evacuated Bassemont on Friday. There is a contradictory news of the Germany force beyond Vendome having met two French corps on Friday.

CORRESPONDENCE.

To the Editor of the Examiner. Dear Sir—In your issue of the 26th ult., you have given us an excellent Editorial on Railways, encouraging us to agitate for a Railway, and do anything, but I do not believe that a Railway would be of incalculable benefit to the farmers of P. E. Island; but I fear that we will never be able to construct a Railway by our own unaided resources.

The people of this Island would not be satisfied with less than one hundred miles of Railroad—it is the work to be undertaken—the cost of which would press upon our limited resources. It would become a heavy burden on the tax-payers of the Island. Notwithstanding, a Railway would benefit the farming population of this Island, in as much that the main in the remote districts, to where the Railroad would extend, would be as near the centre of traffic, and the best shipping places; consequently it would increase the value of property and encourage agricultural improvements, but a Railway cannot be expected without a large increase of taxation, and a tax from which we would derive no benefit while the road would be in course of construction, unless we would consider it a benefit to have so much money squandered in the construction of a road.

Now, Mr. Editor, the great objection to the union of the provinces is taxation. If the Dominion Government would guarantee us an amount sufficient to construct a Railway of sufficient length to satisfy the Islanders, it ought to be an inducement for us to join the union, as well as relieve us of the burden of the cost of constructing a Railway, as it is the result of the property as an agricultural people would be vastly increased by the free intercourse that would necessarily follow from Confederation, and it is not probable that if we remain obstinate and refuse to join the union, that the Dominion Government will impose tax upon our agricultural produce, that would be a grievous burden on our farmers, from which we would receive no benefit.

Five or six days afterwards, when at Canoe, the Victoria lost her foremast, and became unmanageable, and drifted about for nine days. Near Sable Island, they were fallen in with by a vessel bound to Boston, taken on board, and landed there the last week in December.—Id.
