Smooth pacing Royal Bank knocked another Maritime record by the wayside yesterday when he paced the second mile of the two year old pace in 2:19 1-5, the fastest mile ever paced in the two year old class by a horse owned and bred in the Maritimes.

The old Maritime record was held by Hilda Budlong who paced the mile in 2:20 1-4. Resourceful paced the mile in 2:19 2-5 as a two year old but Resourceful was not Maritime bred.

Royal Bank, the strapping son of Federal, nearly beat Hilda Budlong's old mark in the first race. The brown stallion did the mile in 2:20 2-5 which was 3-20 of a second slower than the mile of the Budlong mare.

But driver Harley Harrison left no doubts about it in the second mile. He took Royal Bank to the middle of the back stretch in second place behind Venita Pearl before pulling out and from there to the wire every post was a winning one.

Venita Pearl raced with Royal Bank right to the wire but did not have enough to win. Money Royal stayed with the leaders all the way to the home stretch but fell behind at the finish.

Venita Pearl was down to the quarter in 35 seconds in the record breaking mile. Time of the half was 1:11 and the time of the three quarters was 1:46.

Royal Bank led all the way in the first race. Money Royal came up from third place in the back stretch to battle it out with the big pacer and came a close second. The new record holder is owned

## 3-Way Split For Top Honors Last Night In Free-For-All Pace

A tiring Loch Hanover gamely held onto his dwindling lead in this last night of the free-for-all last night at the Exhibition track and forced a three way split of top honors between himself, Argot Pointer and Johnny Kalmuck in the six horse field free-for-all pace.

Sleek little Judy Kalmuck paced her way to two heat victories and emerged the only double heat winner of the night. Other winners were Anyway, Dale B., Pet Hanover and Miss Donna Mae.

The largest crowd of the September meet sat in at the race, held under a clear harvest moon, and they witnessed some of the finest track battles waged here in weeks.

Loch Hanover with Claude O'Brien in the sulkie got away to the top in the last heat and was never headed. At the middle of the back stretch on the first time around Johnny Kalmuck skipped and almost came to a dead stop causing Vella La Vella and Argot Pointer to pull up and lose valuable ground.

But although she was about five length behind Vella La Vella she was not through. She turned on a burst of speed and caught up to Prince Budlong at the upper turn. Vella remained in third place until the upper turn again where she came up with Loch. The two battled it down the stretch with the finish being decided by the photo.

Vella was close on the second heat but was again nosed out this time by Argot Pointer. The first turn went to the top at the first turn followed by Prince Budlong and Vella. Vella came up from two lengths behind but could not make it.

Big Johnny Kalmuck paced his way to victory in the first dash. Johnny was in third place until he pulled out near the top of the back stretch and beat out Loch Hanover and Prince Budlong.

Judy Kalmuck pulled a surprise in the third race when she went away on the rail and stayed there. Her toughest competition was supplied by Yankee Dale who came second. Judy went away in number nine position the next time but again she shot to the top and could not be caught.

Claude O'Brien drove Dale B home a winner in the second race as the little gelding outlasted Miss Commando and a driving Miss Donna Mae. Miss Donna Mae was not to be denied in the sixth race as she went to the top in the back stretch and stayed there to the wire.

Anyway, a little trotting mare, driven by Dave Wisner won the first race of the night when she beat out a terrific finish by Miss Judy Dale. James McGregor drove Pet Hanover to the top in the third race after a battle with Tracey Direct, driven by Sam Kennedy.

## Pronto Don Sets New 2-Mile World Record

WESTBURY, N. Y., Sept. 13 (AP) — Pronto Don from the Hayes Fair And Stable of Duquoin, Ill., rushed up in the stretch tonight to win the \$50,000 Roosevelt two-mile trot at Roosevelt Raceway and set a world record of 4:10 4-5.

It was a repeat victory for the six-year-old which won the rich trot a year ago. Demon Hanover, owned by Harrison Hoyt of Bethel, Conn., led most of the way only to fade under the stretch drive and wind up second—where he finished a year ago.

Third was Star's Pride, owned jointly by E. Roland Harriman of Goshen, N. Y., and L. B. Shepard, Hanover, Pa.

The old world mark of 4:17 flat was set in this same race by Proximity in 1948. Seldom in harness racing history has a horse clipped 6 1-5 seconds from a record such as the flying Pronto Don did tonight with the masterful driving of Bennis Schue.

Not only did Pronto Don crack the world record from the trotting horse, but he lowered the pacing standard of 4:13 2-5 set at this track by Scottish Fence in winning the \$50,000 Nassau two-mile here earlier this summer.

The winner paid \$5.00, \$4.00 and \$2.90. Demon Hanover returned \$3.80 and \$2.60 to place, the Star's Pride \$2.40 to show.

Brewer's Gallon, owned by J. C. Cruickshank of Halifax never was better than sixth.

## Yonkers Raceway Season Extended

YONKERS, N. Y., Sept. 13 (AP) — The Yonkers Raceway was granted a 16-day extension of its racing season today by the New York Harness Racing Commission.

The Yonkers fall season now will run from Sept. 14 to Nov. 15. Previously it was to have ended on October 27.

## Cleveland Remains One Game Ahead Of Yanks; Boston Still In Running

(By The Canadian Press)

Cleveland Indians remained one game in front of New York Yankees in the neck-and-neck American League pennant race Thursday as the two front-running teams absorbed defeats.

Washington's Bob Porterfield pitched a brilliant three-hitter in a night game at Washington to defeat Cleveland 1-0.

Virgil Trucks and Detroit Tigers dealt another blow to the bombers' pennant ambitions as they romped to a 9-2 triumph over the world champions.

Beaten 18 straight times by the league's top three clubs and whipped in nine of their last 10 games, the Senators produced their only run off Bob Lemon in the third inning as the result of a two-base error by second baseman Bobby Avila.

Avila permitted Irv Noren's hard grounder to get between his legs and when the ball trickled into centerfield Noren legged it safely to second. Mickey Vernon, who accounted for three of Washington's 10 hits off Lemon, singled to score Noren.

Porterfield walked four and struck out six.

Trucks cruised to his 10th victory and 100th of his major league career as the Tigers jumped lefty Ed Lopat and Tom Morgan for seven runs in the fifth inning to assume a 9-1 lead.

Trucks also became the only pitcher to beat the Yanks four times this season. The loss was the Yanks third straight to a second-division club. The last place St. Louis Browns beat them twice Tuesday.

Rookie Mickey Mantle blasted Truck's first pitch of the game for a home run but the Tigers nicked Lopat for single runs in the third and fourth innings to take a 2-1 advantage.

The Yanks fell apart in the fifth. Steve Souchock, Jerry Frisdy and Don Kolloway led off with successive singles. Bob Swift followed with a safe bunt and Trucks with a two-run single to chase Lopat. Morgan entered and fanned Johnny Lipon but George Kell kept the rally alive with a single and Vic Wertz clouted his 23rd homer to complete the scoring.

The loss also endangered the Yanks' lead over the third-place Boston Red Sox. The Sox nipped the Browns, 5-4 in two innings to pull to within 2 1-2 games of the Yanks.

Don DiMaggio tripled with two out in the tenth and scored the winning run on an infield hit by Johnny Pesky. Ned Garver went the distance to absorb the loss while Ellis Kinder, working in his 57th game, was the winner.
