power to state buildings. At New Haven about midway between the state capital and St. Charles, the whole town of 1,000 population was out fortifying itself for the flood.

In Kansas City, the clean-up job in the central industrial district, heart of the meat packing and stockyards area, went ahead but fire hazards still existed.

High water here already has caused an estimated \$1,000,000 damage. Many waterfront plants have shut down. Rail yards in north St. Louis are paralyzed.

As flood waters rushed toward St. Louis, President Truman called on all Americans to give at least \$5,000,000 through the Red Cross for flood relief in Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma and Illinois.

He also allocated \$275,000 of existing federal funds for emergency relief in Missouri. He set \$275,000 for Kansas flood relief last Saturday. These are in addition to the \$23,000,000 voted this week by congress.

Big Layoffs In Automobile Plants

DETROIT, July 19 - (AP) - The old "red-top" bugaboo has reared its head again today to harass automobile industry production - as it always does in times of layoffs.

Production standards disputes, as they are known formally in labor circles, made idle nearly 30,000 workers at Three Chrysler Corp. plants.

These came on top of production cutbacks which already have trimmed far more than 50,000 from the industry's payrolls and will keep more than 150,000 others idle for a week or two shortly.

Material shortages and, to a lesser extent, a dwindling of car sales blamed on government controls have been major causes of the non-strike layoffs.

About 15,000 day-shift employees at Chrysler's Dodge main plant in neighboring Hamtramck stayed away as pickets ringed the factory. Strikers protested layoff of two men accused of failing to meet production standards.

Measures To Deal With Inflation

CANBERRA, July 19 - (CP) - Government economies, possibly higher taxes and restrictions on some private business were listed today by Prime Minister Robert G. Menzies as part of an eight-point program to deal with Australia's inflation problem.

Australia has had growing inflation almost since the end of the war. Tuesday the problem was further complicated when an arbitration board awarded cost-of-living increases to workers in the larger cities, adding between \$75,000,000 and \$90,000,000 (Australian) to the national payroll.

British Physicians Will Resign

LONDON, July 19 - (AP) - All 20,000 physicians in Britain's socialized health service told the government tonight they would resign Sept. 25 unless their demands for increased pay rates were submitted to arbitration.

The ultimatum was delivered to Health Minister Hilary A. Margiquand after British Medical Association committees from all counties conferred for seven hours in London.

Italians Welcome To Canada

OTTAWA, July 19 - (CP) - An immigration department official said today that any "suitable and desirable" Italians are welcome to Canada as immigrants.

He was commenting on a news dispatch from United Nations, N. Y., which last night quoted Giorgio Fadda, an expert from the Italian Labor Ministry as saying that Canada is able to take millions more people, "but the Canadians don't seem to be willing to open their doors."

The official said the comment was typical of a person looking at Canada from abroad, seeing a large country with only a few million people. The remarks usually came from people who did not know Canadian geography or climatic conditions.

There is no quota on the number of Italians allowed into Canada. Since the end of the Second World War about 26,350 Italians have been admitted as immigrants.

Official Charged With Theft

VANCOUVER, July 19 - (CP) - A Vancouver civic official was charged today with theft after he was captured early Wednesday near a ladder outside a woman's bedroom window.

The official is Donald MacDonald, 45, head of Vancouver's Bicycle Registration Bureau for the last nine years. Previously he was on the Vancouver police force for six years.

MacDonald, who was suspended from his post, was captured by a citizen who saw him on the ladder at the window.

Manager Saves Hotel Guests

MONTREAL, July 19 - (CP) - An alert resort hotel manager saved 20 sleeping guests when a kitchen fire swept through the two-story building 20 miles northwest of here early today.

Conrad Messier, manager of the Chateau Du Lac at Point Calumet, wakened the sleeping guests when he smelled smoke about 3 a. m. He turned in a fire alarm, then patrolled the halls of the building until all guests escaped. The \$50,000 building was razed.

Miss Hessian opened her address by congratulating the Board on the excellence of the new office which she stated was one of the finest she had seen anywhere. She commented on the spaciousness of the main office, the privacy of the consultation rooms, and the efficient layout of the fully equipped clinic.

A partial list of the areas with which social workers are concerned, Miss Hessian outlined as follows: Social relationships within the family; marital problems; economic need; homelessness; social aspects of illness, physical and mental; behaviour problems of children; neglect of children; juvenile delinquency; placement of children; unmarried parentage; rehabilitation of prisoners; and adoption of children.
