SOUBIS — Fifteen cases were on the docket here yesterday as Magistrate J.B. Johnston held

a session of his court. The Crown was represented by Deputy Attorney-General J.A. McGuigan of Charlottetown.

Joseph Cecil McInnis of New Zealand, charged with driving while his ability was impaired by alcohol, pleaded guilty and was fined \$100 and costs or 10 days in jail.
